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

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONER OF LABOR.

To the Governor:

Lansing, Michigan, March 31, 1918.

Honorable Albert E. Sleeper, Governor of Michigan,

Dear Sir:—I herewith submit for your consideration, in compliance with Section 2 of Act 285 of P. A. of 1909, as amended, the Thirty-fifth annual report of the Department of Labor, being the business of the

year ending March 31, 1918.

The efforts of the Commissioner of Labor and his Deputies were met with a very much larger degree of public favor and public approval than ever before. There can be no question but that when the world-wide war is over there will be a nation-wide demand that there shall be a more equitable distribution of the burdens and privileges of life. It is hardly to be expected that longer delay to this demand for industrial and social justice will be altogether satisfactory to labor, nor will it be denied that the influence of this demand is tangible and insistent, and that more and more it will be effective in providing desirable results and improved conditions.

It was discovered shortly after accepting the commissionership on July 1, 1917, that there was a lack of safety and sanitary standards for the guidance of the inspection force. It therefore became evident, if the Deputy factory inspectors sent out by the Department were to be of any service to the industries of the State of Michigan, that suitable standards should be drafted which would enable the deputy factory inspector to act with more uniform intelligence and reasonableness than they otherwise could. Acting upon that, a very extensive investigation was made into the causes that contributed to the great number of accidents occurring from day to day, even after the most painstaking efforts of the officials who are charged with the duty of reducing accidents to the minimum. A number of facts were brought out that are of great interest and value to those engaged in the furtherance of safety movements and the avoidance of accidents in the manufacturing industries of the State.

After careful study of the conditions found, it was thought advisable to call the employers' attention to their duties to the employees. I personally could see no reason why an institution should not furnish a place of employment which would be safe for employees therein, and frequenters thereof, and which should furnish and use safety devices and

safe guards, and adopt and use methods and processes reasonably adequate to render such employment and places of employment safe.

It cannot be too strongly impressed upon the owner, or his agent or his superintendent, or any other person in charge of foundry, warehouse, storeroom, or any place where labor is employed, that in no case should any employee be allowed or permitted to remove, displace, damage, destroy or carry off any safety device or safeguard furnished and provided for use in any employment or place of employment, nor interfere in any way with the use thereof, by any other person, nor shall any employee be permitted to interfere with the use of any method or process adopted for the protection of any employee in such employment or place of employment, or frequenter of such place of employment, nor fail or neglect to do every other thing reasonably necessary to protect the life, health, safety, or welfare of such employees or frequenters.

Labor conservation at all times means much to society; but at this particular time, when the agencies of production are taxed to what may be termed the breaking point of human effort, it is of vital importance to our government now and for the future carefully to put this policy into practice, for with the ending of the war the nation that has best conserved its labor power will forge to the front commercially on account of the advantage it will have in production.

Conservation of labor makes for both an adequate and a greater efficiency, two things which are most essential for the successful prosecution of the war and absolutely necessary if we hope to hold our own in the grasp for trade that will ensue after the war is over.

It was strongly impressed upon the managers, superintendents and foremen of every manufacturing establishment through our deputy factory inspectors, that the man who is not over-fatigued at the end of the day's work, the well-paid contented man, the man with a grievance, right or wrong, who has assurance that he can get a respectful hearing, will be the greatest medium through which to conserve labor. These things tend to minimize sickness and create incentive for alertness while producing, which in turn prevents accidents and gives ambition to expend the full amount of energy in the given time for a day's work when it is reasonable.

On the other hand, the man who has long hours, who is over-fatigued and who works under conditions that are more or less hazardous, has no thought other than a perfunctory performance of his task.

WOMEN WAGE EARNERS

The most important question that the Labor Department has to deal with is that which has to do with women wage earners. The world war has brought about a revolution in women's work. Woman's tendency to venture more and more into traditional occupations of men received an enormous acceleration when the first soldiers were called to the colors abroad. Thousands of women are now working in occupations that not even the most advanced suffragist ever asked to be thrown open to them. There is literally not a thing that man has done that women are not now doing. This is not only true of manufacturing work and the professional and business occupations, but it is also true of the hardest kind of mechanical and laboring work.

So there has arisen the most vital problem that has ever faced the Department and the State. Women have been employed in some occupations in which men only were formerly employed, and for which little or no protection was provided by law. Again in some cases new dangers have developed for which former laws made no specific provisions.

In 1916 there was employed in the work shops and factories in Michigan 72,613 women, 14 years of age and over pursuing gainful occupations, of whom 72,063 were over 16 years of age.

In all groups of occupations the number of women to each man has increased, or the number of men to the number of women has decreased since the beginning of the war. The change in some instances has been remarkably abrupt, and must continue to be increasingly so.

The specification question asked: What will be the reactions between this excessive and abrupt employment of women, the diminuation in the number of working men, and the effect upon labor conditions generally throughout the State.

A great number of industries throughout the State have sought to break down the standards regarding the hours of labor women and children are permitted to work in gainful occupations. The British official report, states that "given the necessity for this it has been the business of the government to see that the relaxations in hours of labor should react with a minimum of evil results upon health, although the period during which women have been employed under war-time stress is too short for some of the less obvious effect of occupational influences upon their health to be measured, there is a considerable body of evidence that the work of the present day is overtaxing their strength.

The engagement of women in the manufacturing of war meterials, for instance, presents many features of outstanding interest. There, workers include dressmakers, laundry workers, textile workers, domestic servants, electrical workers, shop assistants, women and girls of every social grade and of no previous wage earning experiences. The danger of industrial employment to these workers include not only the risk of injury from accident but also the risk to health arising from the conditions under which an industry may be conducted. The chief perils are the lack of air, the presence of poisonous or irritating fumes, contact with

poisonous materials, exposure to unnatural temperature or degrees of moisture and machinery.

The routine of attending a machine involves strain enough at best. If the degree of attention necessary at the outset continued through any extended period, the strain would be destructive. This is the more true the higher the original quality of the nervous system concurred. For a normally constituted person such a continued strain would be impossible without grave danger.

As today the metal trades are in the ascendency, it is pertinent to remark that the hazard to women in these industries is distinct and considerable; that when men and women work at the same task its

dangers menace the women much more seriously.

The dangers from machinery were most marked in the various metal working trades, and in paper box making. The most frequent risk was in connection with various forms of power or stamping presses, and the corner staying machines in box factories. In both cases the danger arises from the fact that in adjusting her work the operator's hands must approach or reach a spot at which a few seconds later a crushing blow is to be delivered by a metal stamp or die. The danger of accident or miscalculation is obvious.

CHILD LABOR

It is a source of pleasure to be able to record the favorable attention that has been given to Michigan during the last year, and the kindly references that have been made to this State by the national government as well as a great number of publications interested in the subject, through the fact that it is one of the few states possessed of a child labor law to any degree responsive to the present status of public opinion and widespread demand on that question. It should not be insisted upon or even admitted that the prohibition and regulation now provided for in our statutes with reference to Child Labor represent the forward limit of public need and public requirements on that question.

Our present state law on that subject was strengthened at the last session of the legislature, which provided that no child under 15 years of age shall be employed, permitted or suffered to work in or in connection with any mercantile institution, store, office, hotel, laundry, manufacturing establishment, mine, bowling alley, billiard or pool room, theater, passenger or freight elevator, factory or workshop, telegraph or messenger service. However, this section does not prohibit a child of 14 years or over from working on Saturday or other days during the school year outside of school hours or during the established vacation period.

The compulsory school law of our state assists in the enforcement of this requirement, and provides a greatly appreciated reinforcement to our general child labor regulations as does the United States Child Labor Law, which became effective September 1st, 1917.

At a conference of state officials held in Washington on July 27th,

1917, at which officials from 29 states were present, the motion that it was the sense of the conference that it would be mutually helpful if state officers were deputized under the United States Child Labor Law was unanimously carried. In accordance with that vote the Secretary of Labor approved the deputizing or commissioning as inspectors under the United States Child Labor Act of the state officers who are charged under the state statutes with the enforcement of the State Child Labor Laws. The powers which this commission gave the commissioner of labor and deputy factory inspectors are those enumerated in Sec. 3, Act and Regulation 9 of the Rules and Regulations approved by the Board of Secretaries on August 14th, 1917.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR CARRYING OUT THE PRO-VISIONS OF AN ACT OF THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES APPROVED SEPTEMBER 1, 1916, ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PREVENT INTERSTATE COMMERCE IN THE PRODUCTS OF CHILD LABOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES."

REGULATION 1. CERTIFICATES OF AGE.

Certificates of age, in order to protect the producer, manufacturer, or dealer from prosecution, shall be either:

1. Federal age certificates issued by persons hereafter to be designated by the board for children between 16 and 17 years of age when employment in or about a mine or quarry is contemplated and for children between 14 and 16 years of age when employment in a mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment is contemplated. Such certificates shall contain the following information: (1) Name of child; (2) place and date of birth of child, together with statement of evidence on which this is based, except when a physician's certificate of physical age is accepted by the issuing officer, in which case physical age shall be shown; (3) sex and color; (4) signature of child; (5) name and address of child's parent, guardian, or custodian; (6) signature of issuing officer; and (7) date and place of issuance.

2. Employment, age, or working certificate, permit, or paper issued under State authority in such States as are hereafter designated by the board.

REGULATION 2. PROOF OF AGE.

Persons authorized by the board to issue age certificates under the authority of this act shall issue such certificates only upon the application in person of the child desiring employment, accompanied by its parent, guardian, or custodian, and after having received, examined, and approved documentary evidence of age showing that the child is 14 years of age or over if employment in a mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment is contemplated, or that the child is between 16 and 17 years of age if employment in or about a mine or quarry is contemplated; which evidence shall consist of one of the fol-

lowing named proofs of age, to be required in the order herein desig-

nated, as follows:

(a) A birth certificate or attested transcript thereof issued by a registrar of vital statistics or other officer charged with the duty of recording births.

(b) A record of baptism or a certificate or attested transcript thereof showing the date of birth and place of baptism of the child.

(c) A bona fide contemporary record of the date and place of the child's birth kept in the Bible in which the records of the births in the family of the child are preserved, or other documentary evidence satisfactory to the Secretary of Labor or such person as he may designate, such as a passport showing the age of the child, a certificate of arrival in the United States issued by the United States immigration officers and showing the age of the child, or a life insurance policy; provided that such other satisfactory documentary evidence has been in existence at least one year prior to the time it is offered in evidence; and provided further that a school record or a parent's, guardian's, or custodian's affidavit, certificate, or other written statement of age shall not be accepted except as specified in paragraph (d).

(d) A certificate signed by a public-health physician or a public-school physician, specifying what in the opinion of such physician is the physical age of the child; such certificate shall show the height and weight of the child and other facts concerning its physical development revealed by such examination and upon which the opinion of the physician as to the physical age of the child is based. A parent's, guardian's, or custodian's certificate as to the age of the child and a record of age as given on the register of the school which the child first attended or in the school census, if obtainable, shall be submitted with

the physician's certificate showing physical age.

The officer issuing the age certificate for a child shall require the evidence of age specified in subdivision (a) in preference to that specified in any subsequent subdivision and shall not accept the evidence of age permitted by any subsequent subdivision unless he shall receive and file evidence that the evidence of age required by the preceding subdivision or subdivisions can not be obtained.

REGULATION 3. AUTHORIZATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF STATE CERTIFICATES.

States in which the age, employment, or working certificates, permits, or papers are issued under State authority substantially in accord with the requirements of the act and with regulation 2 hereof may be designated, in accordance with section 5 of the act, as States in which certificates issued under State authority shall have the same force and effect as those issued under the direct authority of this act, except as individual certificates may be suspended or revoked in accordance with regulations 4 and 8. Certificates in States so designated shall have this force and effect for the period of time specified by the board, unless in the judgment of the board the withdrawal of such authorization at an earlier date seems desirable for the effective administration of the act. Certificates requiring conditions or restrictions additional to those required by the Federal act or by the rules and regulations shall not be deemed to be inconsistent with the act.

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REGULATION 4. SUSPENSION OF REVOCATION OF CERTIFICATES.

- SECTION 1. Whenever an inspector duly authorized under this act shall find that the age of a child employed in any mill, cannery, workshop, factory, manufacturing establishment, mine, or quarry as given on a certificate is incorrect, or that the time record is not kept in accordance with regulation 8, he shall notify the child, the employer, and the issuing officer that the certificate or the acceptance of a State certificate for the purposes of this act is suspended and indicate such suspension on the certificate or certificates.
- SEC. 2. A statement of the facts for which the suspension was made shall be forwarded by the inspector to the Secretary of Labor, or such person as he may designate, who will either (a) revoke or withdraw the certificate or the acceptance of the certificate, or (b) veto the suspension, as in his judgment the facts of the case warrant.

Due notice shall be sent to the child's parent, guardian, or custodian, to the employer, and to the issuing officer of the action taken in regard to a suspended certificate.

SEC. 3. If the suspension of a certificate be vetoed, a new certificate shall be issued upon the surrender of the one suspended. If for any reason such new certificate can not be obtained from a State issuing officer, the notice of the veto if attached to a suspended certificate shall be recognized and accepted as meeting the requirements of section 5 of the act.

REGULATION 5. REVOKED OR SUSPENDED CERTIFICATES.

A revoked or suspended certificate will not protect a producer, manufacturer, or dealer from prosecution under section 5 of the act after notice of such suspension or revocation, except as provided in regulation 4.

REGULATION 6. HOURS OF EMPLOYMENT.

In determining whether children between 14 and 16 years of age have been employed more than eight hours in any day the hours of employment shall be computed from the time the child is required or permitted or suffered to be at the place of employment up to the time when he leaves off work for the day, exclusive of a single continuous period of a definite length of time during which the child is off work and not subject to call.

REGULATION 7. DAYS OF EMPLOYMENT.

A child may not be employed for more than six consecutive days.

REGULATION 8. TIME RECORD.

SECTION 1. A time record shall be kept daily by producers or manufacturers, showing the hours of employment in accordance with regulation 6, for each and every child between 14 and 16 years of age, whether employed on a time or a piece-rate basis.

SEC. 2. Certificates of age for children employed in any mine or quarry or in any mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment may be suspended or revoked for failure on the part of a manufacturer or producer to keep time records as required by this regulation or for false or fraudulent entries made therein.

REGULATION 9. INSPECTION.

An inspector duly authorized under this act shall have the right to enter and inspect any mine or quarry, mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment, and other places in which goods are produced or held for interstate commerce; to inspect the certificates of age kept on file, time records and such other records of the producer or manufacturer as may aid in the enforcement of the act; to have access to freight bills, shippers' receipts, or other records of shipments in interstate or foreign commerce kept by railroads, express companies, steamship lines, or other transportation companies so far as they may aid in the enforcement of the act.

REGULATION 10. OBSTRUCTING INSPECTION.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of a producer or manufacturer to produce for examination by an inspector the certificates of age kept on file and any child in the employ of a manufacturer or producer whom the inspector may ask to see. Concealing or preventing or attempting to conceal or prevent a child from appearing before an inspector or being examined by him or hindering or delaying in any way an inspector in the performance of his duties shall be considered an obstruction of inspection within the meaning of section 5.

Sec. 2. No owner, manager, or other person in charge of premises or records shall be subject to prosecution for obstruction of inspection if the inspector shall refuse upon request to submit his identification card for examination by such owner, manager, or other person.

REGULATION 11. REMOVAL.

Withdrawal for any purpose of an article or commodity from the place where it was manufactured or produced constitutes a removal thereof within the meaning of the act; and the 30-day period within which employment of children contrary to the standards prescribed in section 1 of the act results in prohibiting shipment in interstate or foreign commerce shall be computed from that time.

REGULATION 12. GUARANTY.

Section 1. A guaranty to protect a dealer from prosecution under section 5 of the act shall be signed by and contain the name and address of the manufacturer or producer; it shall be specific, covering the particular goods shipped or delivered for shipment or transportation, and shall not be a general guaranty covering all goods manufactured or produced or to be manufactured or produced by the guarantor. It may be incorporated in or attached to or stamped or printed on the bill of sale, bill of lading, or other schedule that contains a list of the goods which the manufacturer or producer intends to guarantee.

SEC. 2. A dealer shipping goods from a State other than the State



of manufacture or production does not require a guaranty in order to be protected from prosecution. (See Sec. 6 of the act.)

SEC. 3. A guaranty substantially in accordance with the following forms will comply with the requirements of the act:

For products of mines or quarries—

(I or we), the undersigned, do hereby guarantee that the articles or commodities listed herein, (or specify the same) were produced by (me or us) in a mine or quarry in which within 30 days prior to removal of such product therefrom 'no children under the age of 16 years were employed or permitted to work.

(Name and place of business of producer or manufacturer.)

(Date of removal.)

For products of a mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment-

(I or we), the undersigned, do hereby guarantee that the articles or commodities listed herein (or specify the same) were produced or manufactured by (me or us) in a (mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment) in which within 30 days prior to the removal of such product therefrom 1 no children under the age of 14 years were employed or permitted to work, nor children between the ages of 14 years and 16 years were employed or permitted to work more than eight hours in any day or more than six days in any week, or after the hour of 7 o'clock p. m. or before the hour of 6 o'clock a. m.

(Name and place of business of producer or manufacturer.)

(Date of removal.)

REGULATION 13. ALTERATION AND AMENDMENT OF REGULATIONS.

These regulations may be altered or amended at any time without previous notice by the board as constituted in section 2 of the act.

AN ACT TO PREVENT INTERSTATE COMMERCE IN THE PRO-DUCTS OF CHILD LABOR, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That no producer, manufacturer, or dealer shall ship or deliver for shipment in interstate or foreign commerce any article or commodity the product of any mine or quarry, situated in the United States, in which within thirty days prior to the time of the removal of such product therefrom children under the age of sixteen years have been employed or permitted to work, or any article or commodity the product of any mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment, situated in the United States, in which within thirty days prior to the removal of such product therefrom children under the age of fourteen years have been employed or permitted to work, or children between the ages of fourteen years and sixteen years have been employed or permitted to work more than eight hours in any day, or more than six days in any week, or after the hour of seven o'clock postmeridian, or before the hour of six o'clock antemeridian: Provided, That a prosecution and conviction of a defendant for the shipment or delivery for shipment of any article or commodity under the conditions

herein prohibited shall be a bar to any further prosecution against the same defendant for shipments or deliveries for shipment of any such article or commodity before the beginning of said prosecution.

- SEC. 2. That the Attorney General, the Secretary of Commerce, and the Secretary of Labor shall constitute a board to make and publish from time to time uniform rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of this act.
- Sec. 3. That for the purpose of securing proper enforcement of this act the Secretary of Labor, or any person duly authorized by him, shall have authority to enter and inspect at any time mines, quarries, mills, canneries, workshops, factories, manufacturing establishments, and other places in which goods are produced or held for interstate commerce; and the Secretary of Labor shall have authority to employ such assistance for the purposes of this act as may from time to time be authorized by appropriation or other law.
- SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of each district attorney to whom the Secretary of Labor shall report any violation of this act, or to whom any State factory or mining or quarry inspector, commissioner of labor, State medical inspector, or school-attendance officer, or any other person shall present satisfactory evidence of any such violation to cause appropriate proceedings to be commenced and prosecuted in the proper courts of the United States without delay for the enforcement of the penalties in such cases herein provided: *Provided*, That nothing in this act shall be construed to apply to bona fide boys' and girls' canning clubs recognized by the Agricultural Department of the several States and of the United States.
- That any person who violates any of the provisions of section one of this act, or who refuses or obstructs entry or inspection authorized by section three of this act, shall for each offense prior to the first conviction of such person under the provisions of this act, be punished by a fine of not more than \$200, and shall for each offense subsequent to such conviction be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000, nor less than \$100, or by imprisonment for not more than three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court: Provided, That no dealer shall be prosecuted under the provisions of this act for a shipment, delivery for shipment, or transportation who establishes a guaranty issued by the person by whom the goods shipped or delivered for shipment or transportation were manufactured or produced, resident in the United States, to the effect that such goods were produced or manufactured in a mine or quarry in which within thirty days prior to their removal therefrom no children under the age of sixteen years were employed or permitted to work, or in a mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment, in which within thirty days prior to the removal of such goods therefrom no children under the age of fourteen years were employed or permitted to work, nor children between the ages of fourteen years and sixteen years employed or permitted to work more than eight hours in any day or more than six days in any week or after the hour of seven o'clock postmeridian or before the hour of six o'clock antemeridian; and in such event, if the guaranty contains any false statement of a material fact, the guarantorshall be amenable to prosecution and to the fine or imprisonment pro-

vided by this section for violation of the provisions of this act. Said guaranty, to afford the protection above provided, shall contain the name and address of the person giving the same: And provided further. That no producer, manufacturer, or dealer shall be prosecuted under this act for the shipment, delivery for shipment, or transportation of a product of any mine, quarry, mill, cannery, workshop, factory, or manufacturing establishment, if the only employment therein, within thirty days prior to the removal of such product therefrom, of a child under the age of sixteen years has been that of a child as to whom the producer or manufacturer has in good faith procured, at the time of employing such child, and has since in good faith relied upon and kept on file a certificate, issued in such form, under such conditions, and by such persons as may be prescribed by the board, showing the child to be of such an age that the shipment, delivery for shipment, or transportation was not prohibited by this act. Any person who knowingly makes a false statement or presents false evidence in or in relation to any such certificate or application therefor shall be amenable to prosecution and to the fine or imprisonment provided by this section for violations of this act. In any State designated by the board, an employment certificate or other similar paper as to the age of the child, issued under the laws of that State and not inconsistent with the provisions of this act, shall have the same force and effect as a certificate herein provided for.

SEC. 6. That the word "person" as used in this act shall be construed to include any individual or corporation or the members of any partnership or other unincorporated association. The term "ship or deliver for shipment in interstate or foreign commerce" as used in this act means to transport or to ship or deliver for shipment from any State or Territory or the District of Columbia to or through any other State or Territory or the District of Columbia or to any foreign country; and in the case of a dealer means only to transport or to ship or deliver for shipment from the State, Territory, or district of manufacture or production.

SEC. 7. That this act shall take effect from and after one year from the date of its passage.

MEMORANDUM FOR STATE OFFICIALS COMMISSIONED UNDER THE UNITED STATES CHILD LABOR ACT.

A number of inquiries have come to this Division with reference to the evidence on which prosecutions for violations of the United States Child Labor Law may be filed. Some state officers who discover violations of the standards of hours and ages laid down in Section 1 of the Federal Act desire that the evidence of removal and shipment be secured by this Division. This we shall be glad to do although it may not always be possible to make the necessary investigation during the 30-day period following the discovery of the violations. Reports and requests from state officers will, however, be given the promptest possible consideration. Some state officers have expressed the desire to complete the evidence on the cases they discover and it is for the assistance of these and as a matter of general information that the inclosed statement is sent you.

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MEMORANDUM FOR STATE OFFICERS SENT IN RESPONSE TO A NUMBER OF INQUIRIES AS TO THE PRACTICE THE CHILD LABOR DIVISION IS FOLLOWING IN SUSPENDING FEDERAL CERTIFICATES OR THE ACCEPTANCE FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE FEDERAL ACT OF STATE CERTIFICATES IN DESIGNATED STATES.

Inspectors for this Division are instructed to suspend on the following grounds:

Suspension of Certificates.—Inspectors of the Child Labor Division are instructed to suspend Federal certificates or the acceptance for the purposes of the Federal Act of State certificates on the following grounds:

- If inspector finds upon investigation that the child's age is incorrectly recorded on the certificate.
- (2) If a manufacturer or producer does not keep a time record as provided for in Regulation 8.
- (3) If the documentary evidence required under the State law in a designated State or under Regulation 2 in a State in which Federal certificates are issued is obtainable and was not submitted and passed on by the issuing officer.

Notice of suspension, on the appropriate blank forms will be sent (1) to the child, (2) the employer, (3) the issuing officer; and a notice, together with full statement of facts, will also be sent the Director of the Child Labor Division. On the basis of this report the action taken will be either (1) revocation of certificates or (2) veto of inspector's action in suspending certificates.

What is necessary to show violation of the United States Child Labor Act:

- (1) Transportation, shipment or delivery for shipment in interstate or foreign commerce from the state of manufacture or production by a manufacturer, producer, or dealer, together with proof of
- (2) Employment of children in a mine, quarry, mill, factory, etc., contrary to the standards laid down in Section 1 of the Act, together with proof of
- (3) Removal of the products so transported, etc., within a period of 30 days subsequent to the time that the standards of the employment of children as laid down in Section 1 of the Act were found to have been violated.

If in the course of an inspection of an industry evidence of the violation of the standards of hours or ages is discovered specific evidence of (1) and (3) must then be secured. If children who are under 14 years of age are found employed in a factory, mill, workshop, etc., or under 16 years of age employed in a mine or quarry, but the employer has recognized certificates of age on file showing the children to be over 14 years of age in the case of the former or over 16 years of age in the case of the latter, the employer is protected against prosecution under

the Federal Act. In such cases certificates can be suspended and subsequent employment of the children would render the employer liable.

Proof of Removal.—See Regulation 11.—The inspector should witness a removal of the products after making his inspection of the mine or factory. A record should be made of (a) the name of the shipping clerk or other persons concerned with removal and (b) the time of removal. The goods removed and their destination should be noted so that freight bills and invoices covering the same goods can be secured. In every case the removal reported should be subsequent to the discovery of children employed in violation of the standards laid down in Section 1 of the Act, although it may be on the same day. If removal is made to a warehouse or storeroom for storage before shipment this constitutes a "removal" within the terms of the Act. It is easier to complete the evidence if a removal destined for immediate shipment is witnessed. If removal to warehouse occurs, identifying marks should be noted so that shipment of the same goods can be traced.

Proof of shipment in interstate or foreign commerce.—The inspector should ascertain whether the shipment is made by a dealer or by the producer or manufacturer. Shipment is established by the records of the carrier and by invoices of the producer or manufacturer. Access to these records is given the inspector by Section 3 of the Act and Regulations 9 and 10. Evidence of two or more shipments should be procured when possible.

Copies of the freight or way bill for the goods whose removal was witnessed by the Inspector should be made.—Forms will be furnished for this purpose on request. If a copy is made by agent on the railroad form this is acceptable. District Attorneys very frequently request the names and addresses of employees of the railroad over which shipment was made in order that subpoenas may be issued to such parties requiring them to produce original way bills or other records necessary to establish an interstate transaction. In the space provided for that information the inspector should always include the name and address of the station agent at the point of destination, and by inquiry of the agent ascertain and report the name and address of the auditor or other official to whom the original way bill or similar record is referred for filing after the consignment has been delivered to the consignee. subpoena duces tecum issued upon the auditor does not necessarily require his personal attendance as a witness. The attendance of some clerk in the office with a knowledge of the records will suffice.

Copy of Invoices covering goods whose removal was witnessed.—For use as evidence to establish the interstate shipment, or delivery for shipment, the original or a copy of the invoice covering the consignment whose removal was witnessed by the inspector should be obtained at the mine, factory, mill, etc. Forms for copying such invoices will be supplied on request.

Proof of age and hours employed.—This would be the same as under the state laws. A certified copy of a birth or baptismal record should be submitted if it can be secured. Bible records and passports are also very good evidence. If none of these is obtainable a parent's affidavit should be secured. A statement as to school records or other evidence of age may also be submitted.

Hours of work.—If employment of children between 14 and 16 years of age for more than eight hours is alleged, statement as to

- (1) What time-record shows. (An identifying description of the time-record should, if possible, be given.)
- (2) What inspector himself observed.
- (3) If (1) or (2) cannot be furnished, the names of responsible adults who have first hand evidence of hours children were employed should be submitted with report. If employment after 7 p. m. or before 6 a. m. is alleged the same rule should be followed. If inspector, himself, witnessed the employment, exact hour and nature of employment should be stated.

Legal name of establishment necessary.—In order to file the necessary information the United States Attorney must have the name of the firm under which the business is conducted. State specifically whether the concern is a partnership, corporation, or joint stock company. Give place of incorporation and the full names of the principal officers. If it is a partnership give the full names of the members. If the shipment is made by a dealer these facts should also be given about the dealer.

MICHIGAN FREE EMPLOYMENT OFFICES.

As long as men and women have to pay for the opportunity of getting employment, we must assume the position as direct competitor of the private employment agencies. No employment is created by reason of the State going into the Free Employment Agency business, nor does the State Free Employment Bureau solve any unemployment problems. The duty that confronts the superintendent of the Free Employment Bureau is to enable employer to get in touch with the right kind of help and at the same time save the person seeking employment an enormous cost in money. Often an employer wants a particular class of workmen and can get them only by advertising. Then what is the result? He gets all kinds of answers for that particular class; a confusing group, and very hard to choose from. On the other hand a man may have been tramping the streets in search of work for weeks, and when he finally gets it, learns that his employer has been looking for just such a man for months. These are the reasons that brought into existence the State Free Employment Bureau.

Although these free employment bureaus are maintained for all the people of the state, one of the greatest difficulties we have to contend with, is how to handle applicants living outside the towns in which offices are maintained. In a great many cases the employer wants to interview several applicants, and the wages, hours of work and living conditions have to be explained so there will be no misunderstanding. When an out-of-town applicant writes that he wants to go on a particular job, we can not ask him to pay his way to town on the chance that the employer may take him. If an applicant spent time and money on a fruitless effort he would naturally hold the office to blame, so we find that the

applicant on hand generally gets the job and each particular office is maintained practically for the benefit of the residents of that city. The only feasible remedy apparent is to establish a free employment office in the city where a private agency has found it profitable.

The solution of the employment problem is of the greatest importance to the individual, but in times such as we are now passing through, it is

of even greater importance to the nation.

The year from December 1st, 1916, to November 30th, 1917, constituted the greatest period of activity and accomplishment in the existence of the Michigan Free Employment Bureau. The vital question that is facing us at all times and one to which we give a great deal of thought and study, is that of unemployment. The Michigan Free Employment Bureau was created for the fundamental purpose of eliminating a great and useless human waste. This waste is the energy expended in the seeking of employment by men and women who are willing to work, but through their limited opportunities are unable to learn where they may find employment for which they are best adapted. While time and energy are being wasted by the capable workers seeking employment, it is probably safe to assume that in normal times and at various localities, economic waste is accumulating in the mills and workshops of employers who have work to be performed and are unable to procure employees for its proper performance. This is likewise true of the conditions found on the farm.

During the months of May, June, July and August the activities of the ten employment bureaus were largely securing labor for farms, through the state. The superintendents in charge of the various offices were instructed to subordinate everything to this work, because of the great importance to the State and to the nation at this critical time. During the year there were 8,205 men placed on farms.

No better recommendation could be had for the Department's activities in behalf of the assistance furnished by the Department to the farmers during the busy season than is provided through the following letter from C. L. Brady, County Agricultural Agent of St. Clair county, addressed, Michigan Free Employment Bureau, 52 W. Larned St., Detroit.

The time during the months of July and August was almost entirely occupied with the farm labor problem, and this, together with other work in the field, has made it impracticable to keep the public informed through the papers regarding the progress of county agent work during the past three months. On this account, perhaps a review of the activities of the office in connection with the farm labor problem will be of interest.

An extreme effort has been put forth to keep St. Clair county farmers supplied with help this summer, but during the latter part of July and the first half of August it was impossible to keep up with the demand. The cold, wet weather in the early part of the season made the farmer reluctant to accept help, and when good weather did arrive over fifty applications for men came to the office in the space of three or four days. Continual advertising was done locally for farm hands and from three to five trips to Detroit per week were made to bring them out. A few men have been obtained from Port Huron and vicinity, but about 90 per

cent of all those secured have been obtained from the Michigan Free Employment Office at Detroit. Up to the present time a total of 107 men have been secured and located on farms in St. Clair county. The farmers, together with the number of men furnished them, are given below by townships:

In all cases where more than two men were furnished on one farm, it was because the first ones either did not prove satisfactory, or did not stay, thus making it necessary to bring others to take their place. A summary of the above lists shows that sixteen of the twenty-three townships in St. Clair county were reached with this project, and that they rank in respect to the number of men obtained in the following order: Wales 20, Mussey 15, Kenockee 12, Riley 10, Grant 10, Berlin 6, Columbus 6, Port Huron 5, Emmett 4, Clyde 4, Kimball 4, Lynn 3, Fort Gratiot 3, Casco 3, St. Clair 1, and China 1.

A review of the records shows that applications were made for a total of 125 men, and that the 106 obtained constituted 86 per cent of the number asked for. In selecting the 106, fully that many more who presented themselves were discarded as unfit. It was made a practice not to hire a man unless he appeared to be reasonably clean and had had some experience. In handling so many, however, some mistakes were bound to occur especially in regard to the latter requirement, and these were responsible for the most part for the inefficient men mentioned above.

The requests were recorded as they came to the office, and as nearly as possible were filled in the same order. It was not always practicable to do this, however, as frequently it was necessary, in order to hold a number of men who were acquainted, to locate them conveniently near each other; at other times farmers would be waiting at the office when the County Agent arrived with the hands and hire them in spite of his efforts to observe the priority of applications; it should be remembered, too, that in this total of 106 men were included all ages, types, classes, and kinds of dispositions, and the success of the venture many times depended largely upon getting a certain man in the right place, for farmers, themselves, vary as well as the farm hands, and occasionally there was a noticeable example of a man proving to be very satisfactory on one farm, but when transferred to another, did not suit at all. With this project, as with all others, though, it was designed to serve all parts of the county alike, and give both the farmer and the hired man a square deal. Comparatively few attempts were made on the part of the farmers to take any unfair advantage of the men brought here, and this contributed much to the success of the work. Many of the men, when they were through with a job, returned to Detroit and applied for another, and the reputation established at the Employment Office by any certain county depended largely upon the character of the report the men made

when they went back, and every effort was made by this office to make good the promises to the men regarding wages, kind of place, etc. The excellent co-operation given by most of the farmers has occasioned the minimum amount of trouble and dissatisfaction, and many of the men who expected to stay but a few days are still working in the county after a period of nearly three months, and others whom I have met during late trips to the Employment Office have been glad to come to St. Clair County the second time. During the haying and harvest season, when so many men were demanded, the plan was to arrive at Port Huron one day and distribute the men across the county, leaving the car at Imlay City or Almont in order to return to Detroit at night; the next day the hands obtained would be taken out on the Imlay City line and brought into the county from the west. This method made it most convenient to get help into all portions and placed every section on the same basis as far as opportunity to obtain men was concerned.

Upon studying the records from the standpoint of efficiency of the men furnished, it is found 80 of the total of 106 have proven to be good hands, while the remaining 26 ranked from poor to useless. This, after all, is really the true measure of the success of the whole work, and shows that approximately 75 per cent of all the men placed were found

at least fairly satisfactory.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Gypsum mines, as well as all other underground operations in Michigan, including the iron mines, the copper mines and fire clay and shale operations, as well as the coal mines, should be subject to investigation and inspection under the direction of the Commissioner of Labor. It should further be enacted that where conditions are found to be dangerous and unsafe and where the ventilation is such as to lead to constant discomforts and to sickness of underground workers, there should be given authority to properly force a remedy.

Accidents causing the loss of two or more days to the injured should be sent to the Labor Department and immediate notice of the death of an employee resulting from an accident that an investigation might be made and steps taken to prevent a recurrence of similar accidents.

Although the Free Employment Bureaus are maintained for all the people of the State, one of the greatest difficulties we have to contend with is, how to handle the applicants living outside of the towns in which offices are maintained. The only feasible remedy apparent is to establish a state free employment office in each city where a private agency has found it profitable.

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Hon. Richard H. Fletcher, Commissioner of Labor, Lansing, Michigan:

Dear Sir:—The following is a general report of the work done by this Department in Wayne County, from July 1st, 1917, to Dec. 31st, 1917, together with certain recommendations which I deem necessary.

Upon my assuming office, I found the factory inspection for the current year under way, which we completed within the prescribed time, in addition to several hundred new inspections. For a detailed report on inspections, I respectfully refer you to the daily statistical report, now on

file at the Lansing office.

Owing to the change in the industrial situation, many questions have arisen which heretofore have not come to the attention of the inspector. The manufacture of war munitions and the increase in production in other industrial lines, has necessitated the employment of a large number of women and has shown us the need of more stringent legislation: for example, we have found that women have been forced or permitted to work on machines, side by side with white and colored men. The present law does not make provision for moral protection of females over twentyone years of age and it is my recommendation that segregation of women employees be made a law. We even found in foundries that women were required to handle moulds weighing forty pounds or thereabouts, and it seems to me that this department should be given discretionary powers covering conditions such as these. Allowing women to work on dangerous machinery, or at hazardous employment may be necessary in time, should the war continue, but I do not believe at the present time, the need is so great. We should expend our energies at this time, to conserve the health and strength of our women, the Mothers of our Nation and, only as a last resource, sacrifice them on the altar of industry. I'do not wish to appear radical in this matter, and I know there are a number of occupations that women can be engaged in, without danger to their health, however, I sincerely urge that laws be passed giving the factory inspector greater power to regulate the conditions, under which they may be employed, thus preventing the unscrupulous employer, under the guise of patriotism, from profiteering at the expense of the health and morals of our women workers.

The Fifty-Four Hour Law, though very beneficial, does not cover all the industries that women are engaged in. I would recommend that hotels and theatres be included in this law and also that the phraseology of this act be changed, so that all new occupations, that might be created for women, could be brought under this law. We are doing our utmost to enforce the same, and are obtaining gratifying results.

The Federal Child Labor Law, which went into effect on Sept. 1st, 1917, has aided materially in the efficient working of this department, in that, an employer engaged in Inter-State Commerce shipping, who employs a child under age, not only violated the State law, but the Federal law as well, and as a consequence, such employer insists that children seeking employment, secure the proper age certificates.

I would further recommend that absolute abolition of the so-called private employment bureaus, where a fee is charged, for the reason that there is no result obtained by them, that cannot be obtained by the federal and state bureaus, without cost to the applicant. There is one thing that I believe should not be the subject of commercial traffic, or trading,

viz., a job. In any event the law should be amended to the effect that no private employment bureau be permitted to charge a fee of more than

one dollar for the procuring of a position.

With reference to the free employment bureaus, operated by this department, will say that the results obtained, have been very gratifying, but not all that is desired, because of the inadequacy of our appropriation, for the operation of the same and would respectfully suggest that a greater appropriation be asked for, so that this work might be carried on with greater efficiency.

Lastly, I would recommend that Traction Companies, operating suburban and interurban electric lines, be required to heat the vestibules, where the motorman is employed, to the same temperature as the balance of the car, as experience has taught me, in unheated vestibules, he is working under a handicap in severe weather and cannot fully safeguard the lives of the public, neither is it beneficial to his own health to work under these conditions.

In conclusion, I desire to express my appreciation for the hearty cooperation of the major portion of the manufacturers, that I have come in contact with, during my tenure of office, and I also take this opportunity of commending the inspectors who work under me for the very efficient and painstaking manner, in which they have performed the work assigned them, and to you, Mr. Fletcher, permit me to extend the sincere thanks of the members of this Department, for the courteous, considerate and kind treatment you have accorded us, and I congratulate you upon the innovations you have introduced, as well as the humane and successful manner in which you have handled the many intricate problems that have arisen in the Department during your regime.

LABOR LAWS.

Compilation of 1917.

ORGANIZATION, POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

AN ACT to provide for the creation of a department of labor; to prescribe its powers and duties; to regulate the employment of labor; to make an appropriation for the maintenance of such department, and to prescribe penalties for the violation of this act.

[Act 285, P. A. 1909.]

APPOINTMENT OF COMMISSIQUER OF LABOR, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER AND DEPUTY FACTORY INSPECTORS.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Section 1. The governor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint within thirty days after the passage of this act, and every second year thereafter, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, and also within thirty days after the occurrence of any vacancy in the office, a suitable person, who shall be a citizen of this state, as commissioner of labor, who shall hold his office until his successor be appointed and qualified. The title of such officer shall be "commissioner of labor," and the term of office of such commissioner shall be for a period of two years after such appointment. Such commissioner shall keep an office in the city of Lansing, and shall appoint a deputy, whose term of office shall continue during the pleasure of such commissioner. The commissioner may appoint such deputy factory inspectors and assistants from time to time as shall be necessary for the transaction of the business of his office.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR: Created by Act 285 of 1909, and amendatory acts of 1911 and 1913 incorporated with the original act in this compilation. Various additional powers, functions and duties, from time to time conferred and imposed upon the department, are also included in this compilation.

DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT-SPECIAL AGENTS-INSPECTIONS, ETC.

SECTION 2. The duties of such department shall be to collect in the manner herein provided, assort, systematize, print and present to the

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governor, on or before the first day of April, nineteen hundred ten, and annually thereafter, statistical details relating to all departments of labor in this state, including the penal institutions thereof, particularly concerning the hours of labor, the number of employes and sex thereof, the daily wages earned, and savings, the number and character of accidents, the condition of all manufacturing establishments, hotels, stores and workshops where labor is employed, with such other matter relating to the industrial, social, educational, moral and sanitary conditions of the laboring classes and the productive industries of the state, including the names of firms, companies or corporations, where located, the kind of goods produced or manufactured, the time operated each year, the number of employes, male or female, the number engaged in clerical work and the number engaged in manual labor, with a classification of the number of each sex engaged in each occupation and the average daily wages paid each. The commissioner of labor is authorized to appoint special agents to represent the department, with authority to visit firms and establishments, and to collect such statistics and perform such other duties as may be required, with like power as is conferred on said commissioner. The commissioner of labor and all appointees connected with the department, when so directed by said commissioner, shall have full authority to visit and inspect all manufacturing establishments, workshops, hotels, stores and all places where labor is employed, at any reasonable hour, and shall have authority to gather such statistics as may be deemed necessary by the commissioner: Provided, That the commissioner of labor or any one connected with his office, shall not publish, make public, nor give to any individual or to the public the individual statistics obtained from any manufacturing establishment, but all such statistics may be published in connection with other similar statistics and given to the public in aggregate and averages: Provided further, That nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit other state departments from taking transcripts of such individual statistics for statistical and classification purposes only.

EXAMINATION OF WITNESSES-FAILURE TO OBEY SUBPOENA-PENALTY.

Section 3. Such department or any member thereof shall have full power to examine witnesses on oath, compel the attendance of witnesses, the giving of testimony and the production of papers while acting in any part of this state, and witnesses may be summoned by such department or any member thereof, by its process in the same manner, and paid the same fees as are allowed to witnesses attending in the circuit court of any county. Any person duly subpoenaed under the provisions of this section, who shall wilfully neglect to attend or testify at the place named in the subpoena served for such purpose, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction before any court of competent jurisdiction may be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court: Provided, That no witness

shall be compelled to go outside of the county in which he or she resides to testify.

SALARIES, APPROPRIATION AND SUPPLIES.

Section 4. The compensation of such commissioner shall be thirty-five hundred dollars per annum, and that of his deputy, two thousand dollars per annum, together with all necessary expenses, and the compensation of factory inspectors shall not exceed thirteen hundred dollars per annum, and the assistants or special canvassers or clerks in any office of the department shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by such commissioner. All such compensation and also the expense provided for in section one of this act, shall be audited and paid in the same manner as the salaries and expenses of other State officers. Provided, That the amount thereof, exclusive of the compensation allowed to said commissioner and his deputy, shall not in any one year exceed the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars, which sum shall defray the salaries and expenses of the entire department, including factory inspection, the gathering of all statistics, the expense of the several free employment bureaus of this State, the inspection of public buildings, school buildings, opera houses and theatres, and every department of investigation coming within the jurisdiction of such department, for which provision is not otherwise made by law: Provided further, That in addition to the above allowance for expenses, said commissioner shall be authorized to have printed not to exceed five thousand copies of his annual report for the use of the department and for general distribution, and all printing, binding, blanks or map work, and all supplies shall be done or furnished under any contract which the State now has or shall have for similar work with any party or parties, and the expense thereof shall be audited and paid in the same manner as other State printing.

COLLECTING INFORMATION OF OFFICIALS—SPECIAL CANVASSERS.

Section 5. Said department may collect the information called for in section two of this act, or such information as shall by the commissioner be considered essential to perfect the work of the department, from the several state, county, city, village and township officers, and from the officers of prisons, penal and reformatory institutions, or by means of special canvassers under the direction of the commissioner, and it shall be the duty of all such officers to furnish upon the written or printed request of the commissioner such information as shall be considered necessary for the department upon blanks furnished by said department.

DUTIES OF SUPERVISORS AND ASSESSORS.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the several supervisors of the townships, and the supervisor and assessor of the wards of cities in this State, at the time of assessing the property thereof, to obtain the facts and information determined upon by said department, as provided in section five of this act, in accordance with the terms, conditions and requirements of said blanks, and to return said blanks properly filled and



duly certified to by such officer without delay to the commissioner of labor at Lansing.

ACCESSION TO FACTORIES-MISDEMEANOR-PENALTY.

Section 7. The commissioner, his deputy and deputy factory inspectors are authorized to enter any factory, workshop, hotel, store or other place where labor is employed when open or in operation, for the purpose of gathering facts and statistics relating to hours of labor, wages, industrial, economic and sanitary conditions or matters; and if any employer or his or her agent or agents shall refuse to allow the officers of said department to so enter; or shall refuse to give such information when requested by said commissioner or deputy factory inspector, then such employer or his or her agent or agents shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ninety days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

PENALTY FOR FALSELY TESTIFYING-REFUSAL A MISDEMEANOR.

SECTION 8. Any person who shall wilfully and intentionally test 'y falsely before said commissioner or any authorized deputy shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for a period not exceeding five years, and any person who shall refuse to testify before said commissioner or before any deputy thereof shall on conviction thereof be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hurdred dollars or imprisonment not exceeding sixty days or both in the discretion of the court: Provided, That no person or corporation shall be required to answer any question that shall be an improper subject of inquiry or foreign to the object of this act.

EMPLOYMENT OF FEMALES AND MINORS—HOURS OF LABOR—CANNING ESTABLISHMENTS.

SECTION 9. No male under the age of eighteen years, and no female shall be employed in any factory, mill, warehouse, workshop, clothing, dressmaking or millinery establishment, or any place where the manufacture of any kinds of goods is carried on, or where any goods are prepared for manufacturing, or in any laundry, store, shop, or any other mercantile establishment, or in any office or restaurant, for a period longer than an average of nine hours a day or fifty-four hours in any week nor more than ten hours in any one day; and all such establishments shall keep posted a copy of this section printed in large type, in a conspicuous place; in establishments having a time clock such copy shall be posted near the time clock. Copies of this section suitable for posting shall be furnished upon the application of any employer by the Commissioner of Labor: Provided, however, That the provision of this section in relation to the hours of employment shall not apply to nor affect any person engaged in preserving perishable goods in fruit and vegetable canning establish-



ments. No female under the age of eighteen years shall be employed in any manufacturing establishment between the hours of six o'clock p. m. and six o'clock a. m. No child under the age of sixteen years shall be employed in any manufacturing establishment or workshop, mine or messenger service in this State between the hours of six o'clock p. m. and six o'clock a. m. No child under the age of eighteen years shall be employed between the hours of ten o'clock p. m. and five o'clock a. m. in the transmission, distribution or delivery of messages or merchandise.

This and the next two sections are deemed to supersede C. L. 1897, § § 5365-5372.
The provision limiting the employment of females to 54 hours per week is a valid exercise of the police power, not violating the fourteenth amendment of the federal constitution by restricting the right to contract; neither is it class legislation in that it excepts women employed in factories where perishable products are preserved.—Withey v. Bloem, 163/419.

EMPLOYMENT OF CHILDREN—PERMITS ISSUED BY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Section 10. No child under the age of twenty-one years shall be employed, permitted or suffered to work in any theater, concert hall, or place of amusement where intoxicating liquors are sold. No child under fifteen years of age shall be employed, permitted or suffered to work in or in connection with any mercantile institution, store, office, hotel, laundry, maunfacturing establishment, mine, bowling alley, billiard or pool room conducted for profit, theater, passenger or freight elevator, factory or workshop, telegraph or messenger service within this State: Provided, This section shall not apply to any child of the age of fourteen years or over, working on Saturdays or other days during the school year, outside of school hours or during the established vacation periods in preserving perishable goods, in fruit or vegetable canning establishments or in any mercantile institutions, store, office, hotel, laundry, manufacturing establishment, factory or workshop, telegraph or messenger service within this State. It shall be the duty of every mercantile institution, store, hotel, office, laundry, manufacturing establishment, mine, bowling alley, workshop, telegraph or messenger service or any person coming within the provisions of this act to keep a register in which will be recorded the name, birthplace, age and place of residence of every person employed under the age of sixteen years, and it shall be unlawful for any such establishment or person to hire or employ, or permit to be hired or employed or suffered to work, any child under the age of sixteen years without there is first provided and placed on file in the business office thereof a permit issued by the superintendent of schools of the school district in which such child resides, or the county commissioner of schools, or some one duly authorized by him in writing, any of whom shall have power to administer oaths in relation thereto. Such permit shall be returned immediately to the issuing officer by the employer when such child leaves such employment. A child shall be considered as having withdrawn from his employment when he or she shall have absented himself or herself from work for five full working days without explanation. Every limited vacation permit, hereinafter to be described, shall, upon its expiration, be void and of no effect. The said register and permit shall be produced for inspection on demand of any factory inspector appointed under this act. No fee shall be charged for such permit or other

record required by this act by any officer by whom it shall be issued. Every employer complying with the provisions of this section shall be at liberty to employ the person so presenting the permit hereinbefore referred to, and is justified in considering and treating such person as of the age shown in such permit and shall not be liable, if it transpire that such person is under the age represented in such permit, to any greater extent than such employer would be liable if such person were of the age represented. The person authorized and required to issue such permit shall not issue the same until he has received, examined, approved and filed the following papers duly executed:

The school report of said child properly filled out and signed as hereinafter provided: Provided, however, That when such permit is issued during the summer vacation or for working on Saturdays or other days during the school year, outside of school hours no such record shall be required, but all such permits, called in this act limited vacation permits, shall expire upon the first Monday in September, commonly called Labor Day, shall contain a conspicuous statement of the time at which they shall expire and shall be of a special color distinct from regular permits:

A passport, or duly attested transcript of the record of birth, as (b) kept by any duly authorized public authority, or a record of baptism or other religious record, showing the date and place of birth of such child;

(c) A statement from a physician connected officially with the board or department of health, which shall be required, however, only in case the above mentioned official or religious record cannot be produced, which statement shall certify that, in the opinion of the physician issuing said statement, the child is fifteen years of age or upwards, is in sound health and physically able to perform the work which it intends to do. Such statement shall also certify to the correct weight and height of said child, and shall be kept on file by the person issuing working permits; such person may, in his discretion, require also an affidavit from the

parents or other evidence as additional proof of age;

(d) A statement by the issuing officer that he has examined said child, that in his opinion the child can read intelligently and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, that in his opinion the child is fifteen years of age or upwards, fourteen years in the case of a vacation permit or a permit to work on Saturdays or other days during the school year, outside of school hours and has reached the normal development of a child of its age and is in sound health and physically able to perform the work which it intends to do, and that, in his opinion the services of the child are essential to the support of itself or its parents: Provided, That permits for vacation periods and Saturdays or other days during the school year, outside of school hours shall not certify that the wages of the child are essential to the support of the family. In doubtful cases, physical fitness for such work shall be determined by a medical officer of the board or department of health. Every such permit shall be signed in the presence of the officer issuing the same by the child in whose name it is issued; and shall state the date and place of birth of the child, and describe the color of the hair and eyes, the height and weight and any distinguishing facial marks of such child, and that the paper required by the preceding sections has been duly examined, approved and filed,



and that the child named in such permit has appeared before the officer signing the same and been examined. The school record required by this article shall be signed by the principal or chief executive officer of the school which such child has attended and shall be furnished on demand to a child entitled thereto. It shall contain a statement certifying that the child has regularly attended the public school, or schools equivalent thereto, or parochial schools for not less than one hundred days during the school year previous to his arriving at the age of fifteen years or during the year previous to applying for such school record, and is able to read intelligently and write legibly simple sentences in the English language, and in the case of the public schools, has passed satisfactorily the work of the school up to and including the work of the sixth grade, as provided in the course of study of the public schools, or in the case of schools other than public, the equivalent thereto. Such school recordshall also give the age and residence of the child as shown on the records of the school and the name of its parents or guardians or custodian: Provided, That in the case of limited vacation permits or permits to work on Saturdays or other days during the school year, outside of school hours the school record and all other requirements relating to educational qualifications shall be waived, but all other requirements shall be complied with as prescribed in this section. Every month after the issuance of a permit the child shall report to the person who issued same, either in person or in writing, through its parent, or guardian, stating that the child is employed, giving the name of employer and the location of the place of employment, and if not employed said child shall be compelled to attend school: Provided, That nothing in this act shall be used to invalidate the right of any minor over the age of fourteen years to use a working permit issued before the passage of this act;

Any person who shall make a false statement, transcript, passport, school certificate, certificate of physical fitness, school record or any other writing required to be made or filed by the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment for not less than ten days nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court:

Whenever continuation classes shall be established for minors under sixteen years of age working as now permitted by law, or out of school by permission to help at home, every such child residing in any city in which such classes are established shall attend such classes not less than four hours per week and every employer shall allow all minor employes under eighteen years of age who have not completed the eighth grade, a reduction in hours of work of not less than the number of hours the minor is by this section to attend schools.

Act 113 of 1901, prohibiting the employment of anyone under 16 years of age at work dangerous to life or limb, was not intended to prevent the hiring of such a minor as a common laborer.—Antosik v. Mich. Alkali Co., 166/415.

LIABILITY OF EMPLOYER: The employment of a child under 16 years of age to operate a machine dangerous to life or limb (Act 113 of 1901, § 3) constituted actionable negligence.—Sterling v. Union Carbide Co., 142/284; Begold v. Auto Rody Co., 149/14. Whether the employment of such a person to run an electric freight elevator was within that prohibition was a question for the jury.—Brassch v. Mich. Stove Co., 147/676. The employer of a child under 16, without the sworn statement of the parent or guardian (Act 113 of 1901; Am. Act 171 of 1905) was not relieved of liability by the statement of the child that he was over 16.

—Syneszewski v. Schmidt, 153/488; Brassch v. Mich. Stove Co., 153/652. Nor by a similar statement of the child's elder brother.—Beghold v. Auto Body Co., 149/14. Though this act

does not expressly give a right of action to persons injured by its violation, yet a child, injured while unlawfully employed, may maintain an action for damages, unless precluded by some act of his own.—Syneszewski v. Schmidt, 153 / 438. Where the employment of a child in violation of the statute is relied upon as negligence, the declaration must aver facts from which a prohibited employment appears.—Van Wyck v. Dickinson, 148 / 418.

NEGLIGENCE OF INFANT: An infant of 14 years held not guilty of negligence per sc.—Lund v. Sargent Mig. Co., 158 / 3. Contributory negligence of a child employed in a factory in violation of the provisions of this section held to bar recovery.—Woods v. Kalamazoo Paper Box Co., 167 / 514; Beghold v. Auto Body Co., 149 / 14.

ASSUMPTION OF RISK: A servant does not assume the risk due to an omission by the master of a statutory duty imposed for the protection of the servant.—Murphy v. Grand Rapids Veneer Works, 142 / 677; Swick v. Actna Portland Cement Co., 147 / 454; Trombley v. McAfee, 152 / 494; Little v. Bousfield & Co., 154 / 369; Van Doorn v. Heap, 160 / 199; Johnson v. Union Carbide Co., 169 / 651. The doctrine of assumed risk, being predicated on contractural relations, is not binding upon a child employed in violation of the statute.—Dalm v. Bryant Paper Co., 157 / 550. Nor can the risk of injury by the negligence of fellow-servants be assumed by a child under 14 unlawfully employed.—Synezewski v. Schmidt, 153 / 438; Dalm v. Bryant Paper Co., 157 / 550. Relation of the defenses of assumed risk and contributory negligence.—Swick v. Actna Portland Cement Co., 147 / 454. The contributory negligence of plaintiff may be a defense to an action against an employer for personal injuries, notwithstanding a violation on his part of a statutory duty which deprives him of the defense of assumption of risk.—Trombley v. McAfee, 152 / 494; Gehi v. Pittsburg Coal Co., 163 / 285.

CERTAIN WORK NOT ALLOWED FOR FEMALES AND MINORS—AGE CERTIFICATES -THEATRICAL CHILDREN.

SECTION 11. No female under the age of twenty-one years and no male under the age of eighteen years shall be allowed to clean machinery while in motion, nor employed in or about any distillery, brewery, or any other establishment where malt or alcoholic liquors are manufactured, packed, wrapped or bottled, nor in any hazardous employment, or where their health may be injured or morals depraved, nor shall females be unnecessarily required in any employment to remain standing constantly. child under the age of sixteen years shall be employed in or about any theater, variety show, moving picture show, burlesque show, or other kind of playhouse, music or dance hall, poolroom or billiard room: Provided, however, That any male person over sixteen and under eighteen years of age, may be employed in any occupation, other than the cleaning of machinery while in motion and occupations in or about any distillery, brewery or other establishment where malt or alcoholic liquors are manufactured, packed, wrapped or bottled, subject to the following conditions:

Such employment shall be for a total of not more than fifty four hours

in any week, nor more than ten hours in any one day.

The occupation in which such person is employed shall be approved by the Department of Labor as not being injurious to health or morals, or unduly hazardous: Provided, That in all cities in which the Department of Labor maintains a permanent office, the official in charge thereof shall be authorized and required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Labor, and in other cities or municipalities the superintendent of schools shall likewise be authorized and required to issue, upon demand, certificates of age to young persons past the age of sixteen years, in accord with the following conditions, to-wit: The official authorized to issue such certificates shall not issue the same until he has received, examined, approved and filed the following papers, duly executed:

(a) A passport, or duly attested transcript of the record of birth, as kept by any recognized public authority, or a record of baptism or other religious record, showing the date and place of birth of such young person:

A statement from a physician connected officially with the board or department of health, which shall be required, however, only in case the above mentioned official or religious record cannot be produced, which statement shall certify that, in the opinion of the physician issuing said statement, the young person is of the age stated therein. Such statement shall also certify to the correct weight and height of said young person, and shall be kept on file by the official issuing certificates of age; such official may, in his discretion, require also an affiwavit from the parent of the young person concerned, or other evidence, as additional proof of age;

- (c) A statement by the issuing officer that he has examined said young person, and that in his opinion the young person is of the age stated in said certificate of age. Every such certificate shall be signed in the presence of the officer issuing the same, by the young person in whose name it is issued, and shall state the date and place of birth of said person, and describe the color of the hair and eyes, the height and weight, and any distinguishing facial marks of such person, and that the papers required by the preceding section have been duly received, examined, approved and filed, and that the young person named in such certificate has appeared before the officer and been examined. Every employer complying with the provisions of this section shall be at liberty to employ the person so presenting the certificate hereinbefore referred to, and is justified in considering and treating such person as of the age shown in such certificate and shall not be liable, if it transpire that such person is under the age represented in such certificate, to any greater extent than such employer would be liable if such person were of the age represented;
- (d) This act shall not be construed so as to prevent children under sixteen years of age from being employed by traveling theatrical companies whose employment consists of acting a part in the productions of such company.

GUARDING OF HOISTING SHAFTS, WELL HOLES, ELEVATOR OPENINGS, ETC.

SECTION 12. It shall be the duty of the owner, agent or lessee of any manufacturing establishment where hoisting shafts or well-holes are used, to cause the same to be properly enclosed and secured. It shall be the duty of the owner, agent or lessee to provide or cause to be provided at all elevator openings in any manufacturing establishment, workshop, hotel or store, proper trap or automatic doors or automatic gates so constructed as to open and close by the action of elevators either ascending or descending. The deputy factory inspector shall inspect the cables, gearing or other apparatus of elevators in manufacturing establishments, workshops, hotels and stores at least once in each year, and more frequently if necessary, and require that the same be kept in a safe condition, and shall have power to condemn any elevator if in his opinion the same be unsafe, and stop the operation of such elevator until the same be put in a safe condition.

Provisions of Act 113, of 1901, § 5, requiring hoisting shafts and well-holes to be properly enclosed and secured imposes a duty to protect employes and not merely a duty to prevent people from accidentally falling down an elevator shaft from the outside.—Murphy v. Grand Rapids Veneer Works, 142/677. No power is given to a factory inspector to order the construction of an elevator.—Barfoot v. White Star Line, 170/849, 359. Construction of elevators in buildings discussed.—Id. 360. Liability of owner or lessor of a building, part of

which is used for manufacturing purposes by the tenant for failure to install automatic gates.—Barfoot v. White Star Line, 170 / 349. Design of such gates.—Id. Provision of the act of 1901, requiring automatic gates, held not applicable in a certain case.—Delbusso v. American Cement Plaster Co., 165 / 318.

FACTORY INSPECTORS' POWER TO CONDEMN—FIRE ESCAPES—DOORS TO OPEN OUTWARD.

Factory inspectors shall have power to condemn all school houses if in their opinion they are unsafe and liable to collapse and cause the lives of children to be endangered; also factory inspectors shall have power to order fire escapes on all manufacturing establishments, hotels, stores, theatres, schools, halls, public and office buildings two or more stories in height, and apartment houses three or more stories in height, if in the opinion of the factory inspector it be necessary to insure the safety of persons in such places; said fire escape or means of egress, or as many thereof as may be deemed sufficient by the inspector, shall be provided, and where it is necessary to provide fire escapes on the outside of such building they shall consist of landings and balconies at each floor above the first, to be built according to specifications provided by the factory inspector. All doors in school houses and the doors of the capitol building and all state institutions shall open outward. Factory inspectors shall in writing notify the owner, agent or lessee of such manufacturing establishments, hotels, stores, theatres, schools, halls, apartment houses and public and office buildings of the required location and specifications of such escapes as may be ordered and as to all failures to comply with the provisions of this act. Any person, firm or corporation, or any member of any school board, who shall violate or cause to be violated any of the provisions of this section, or shall fail to refuse to erect or cause to be erected any fire escape ordered by any factory inspector, under authority of this section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned for not less than three months nor more than one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

HAND RAILS, ETC.—SCREENS WHERE FEMALES ARE EMPLOYED.

Section 14. Stairways with substantial hand rails shall be provided in manufacturing establishments, and where in the opinion of the factory inspector it be necessary, the steps of such stairs in all such establishments shall be substantially covered with rubber securely fastened thereon, for the better safety of persons employed in said establishments. The stairs shall be properly screened at sides and bottom where females are employed, and the outside doors of such establishment shall swing outwardly, and no doors shall be locked, bolted or fastened during working hours.

A ladder is not a stairway; the two distinguished.—Davis v. Buss Machine Works. 169/498.
At common law a night watchman would assume the risk of using a ladder or stairway with no concealed defects, etc., constructed without a hand rail; but plaintiff did not assume the risk of his employer's failure to comply with this statute.—Id.



SAFEGUARDS ON BELTS, GEARING AND DANGEROUS MACHINERY.

Section 15. It shall be the duty of the owner of any factory, store-house or warehouse, or his agent, superintendent or other person in charge of the same, to furnish or supply or cause to be furnished or supplied, in the discretion of the factory inspector, where machinery is in use, proper shifters or other mechanical contrivances for the purpose of throwing belts on or off pulleys. All gearing or belting shall be provided with proper safeguards, and whenever possible machinery shall be provided with loose pulleys. All vats, saws, pans, planers, cogs, set-screws, gearing and machinery of every description shall be properly guarded when deemed necessary by the factory inspector.

Duty of employer under C. L. 1897, \$ 5349, to safeguard gearing and belting, irrespective of any order by the factory inspector.—Swick v. Actna Portland Cement Co., 147/454. The legislature did not intend by this act to constitute the factory inspector sole judge as to what employment is dangerous to the life and limb of a male under 18 years of age.—Tavinski v. A. Harvey's Sons Mfg. Co., 168/392. Gearing defined and held dangerous.—Id. Introduction of testimony to prove that no guard was used held fatal variance from a declaration alleging the use of a defective guard.—Scherer v. Otis Elevator Co., 167/1.

EXHAUST FANS.

Section 16. Exhaust fans shall be provided for the purpose of carrying off dust from emery wheels and grindstones and dust-creating machinery, wherever deemed necessary by the factory inspector.

Act 136 of 1887 (C. L. 1897, § § 5547-5549) requiring blowers in establishments where emery wheels or belts are used was held constitutional.—People v. Smith, 108/527.

WASH AND DRESSING ROOMS—CLOSETS—RAILWAY CARS FOR SLEEPING OR LIVING PURPOSES.

SECTION 17. Every manufacturing establishment, workshop, hotel or store in which five or more persons are employed, and every institution in which two or more children, young persons or women are employed, shall be supplied with proper wash and dressing rooms, and kept in a cleanly state and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy or other nuisance, and shall be provided, within reasonable access, with a sufficient number of proper water closets, earth closets or privies for the reasonable use of persons employed therein, at least one of such closets for each twenty-five persons employed; and whenever two or more persons and one or more female persons are employed as aforesaid, a sufficient number of separate and distinct water closets, earth closets or privies shall be provided for the use of each sex, and plainly so designated, and no person shall be allowed to use any such closet or privy assigned to persons of the other sex. In all hotels where sleeping rooms are provided for female help, such rooms shall have proper heat and ventilation. Where railway cars are used for sleeping or living purposes or where other premises for sleeping or living accommodations are furnished by any employer or his agent, for men or women engaged in construction of railroad or other work, such cars or other premises shall be maintained in a cleanly and sanitary condition and kept sufficiently heated and well lighted and ventilated and a separate place and facilities shall also be provided for the purpose of drying clothes. Any firm, person or corporation or any agent or foreman thereof, or any contractor or other person who has control over such conditions may be prosecuted at the instance of

the factory inspector or other proper authority when there occurs a violation of this section with respect to the conditions specified therein, over which such person, firm or corporation has control. It shall be unlawful for any employe to do anything to hinder or make difficult, compliance with this section: Provided, That the provisions of this section shall not apply to railway sleeping cars used exclusively for the transportation and accommodation of passengers carried by said railways.

FACTORY INSPECTORS, WHO DEEMED-POWERS AND DUTIES, ETC.

Section 18. The commissioner of labor shall be the chief factory inspector and the deputy commissioner of labor and deputy factory inspectors shall be factory inspectors in the meaning of this act. At least two of such deputy factory inspectors shall be women. Said factory inspectors are hereby empowered to visit and inspect at all reasonable hours, as often as practicable or required, the factories, workshops and other manufacturing establishments in this state where the manufacture of goods is carried on, and all hotels where any person or persons are employed, also all stores in this state. Deputy factory inspectors shall report to the commissioner of labor at such time and manner as he may require. It shall also be the duty of the factory inspectors to enforce all the provisions of this act and to prosecute all violations of the same before a magistrate or in a court of competent jurisdiction in this state.

REPORTS OF DEPUTIES—OATHS.

Section 19. Deputy factory inspectors shall return to the commissioner of labor, as he may require, detailed reports of the results of all inspections, together with statistics gathered, and said commissioner shall keep on file in his office at Lansing a record of all reports so returned. A copy of the report on such inspection and of any order in reference thereto shall be served by the factory inspector on the superintendent, owner or manager of each building, establishment or workshop inspected. Service of such order shall be accepted and a duplicate thereof signed by such superintendent, owner or manager. If the superintendent, owner or manager of whom such signature is demanded shall refuse to so sign such acceptance of service, an affidavit by the inspector showing the facts of such service, demand of signature and refusal shall be sufficient evidence of service when duly filed; but such superintendent, owner or manager shall not thereby be released from any criminal liability attending his refusal under this act. Deputy factory inspectors and special canvassers shall have the same power to administer oaths as is now given to notaries public, in cases where persons desire to verify documents connected with the proper enforcement of this act.

The liability of a master for injury to a servant by reason of failure to guard dangerous machinery, under the provisions of Act 113, of 1901, depends upon the fact of the order having been made by the factory inspector and brought to the notice of the master.—Kerr v. Nat'l Fulton Brass Mfg. Co., 155/191.

ANNUAL INSPECTION OF FACTORIES—SERVICES, HOW PAID—YEARLY REPORT.

Section 20. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act, the commissioner of labor is hereby authorized and required to cause at

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least an annual inspection of all manufacturing establishments, factories, hotels, workshops and stores. Such inspection may be made by the commissioner of labor, the deputy commissioner of labor, deputy factory inspectors, or such other person as may be appointed by the commissioner of labor for the purpose of making such inspection. Such persons shall be under the control and direction of the commissioner of labor. All compensation for services and expenses provided for in this act shall be paid by the state treasurer upon the warrant of the auditor general and audited by the auditor general: Provided, That the commissioner of labor shall present to the government on or before the first day of April of each year, a report of such inspection, with such recommendation as may in his judgment be necessary.

COMPLAINTS OF LABOR LAW VIOLATION.

Section 21. The prosecuting attorney of any county of this state is hereby authorized and shall, upon the complaint on oath of the commissioner of labor or any factory inspector, or of any citizen of the United States, if approved by any factory inspector, prosecute to termination before any court of competent jurisdiction, in the name of the people of the state, actions or proceedings against any person or persons reported to him to have violated any of the provisions of this act.

TENEMENT HOUSE WORK-PERMIT, WHEN GRANTED, ETC.

SECTION 22. No room or apartment in any tenement or dwelling house shall be used for the manufacture of coats, vests, trousers, knee pants, overalls, skirts, dresses, cloaks, hats, caps, suspenders, jerseys, blouses, waists, waist-bands, underwear, neckwear, furs, fur trimming, fur garments, shirts, hosiery, purses, feathers, artificial flowers, cigarettes or cigars, and no person, firm or corporation shall hire or employ any persons to work in any room, apartment or in any building or parts of buildings, at making in whole or in part any of the articles mentioned in this section, without first obtaining a written permit from the factory inspector or one of his deputies, stating the maximum number of persons allowed to be employed therein and that the building or part of building intended to be used for such work or business is thoroughly cleaned, sanitary and fit for occupancy for such work or business. Such permit shall not be granted until an inspection of such premises is made by the factory inspector or one of his deputies. Said permit may be revoked by the factory inspector at any time the health of the community or of those so employed may require it. It shall be framed and posted in a conspicuous place in the room, or in one of the rooms to which it relates. Every person, firm, company or corporation contracting for the manufacture of any of the articles mentioned in this section, or giving out the incomplete material from which they or any of them are to be made, or to be wholly or partially finished, shall, before contracting for the manufacture of any of said articles, or giving out said material from which they or any of them are to be made, require the production by such contractor, person or persons of said permit from the factory inspector, as required in this section, and shall keep a written register of the names and addresses of all persons to whom such work is given to be made, or with whom they may have contracted to do the same. Such register shall be produced for inspection and a copy thereof shall be furnished on demand by the factory inspector or one of his deputies: Provided, That nothing in this section shall be so construed as to prevent the employment of a seamstress by any family for manufacturing articles for such family use. None of the work mentioned in this section shall be done in any room or apartment used for living or sleeping purposes, or which is connected with the room or rooms used for such purposes, and which has not a separate and distinct outside entrance for use of others than members of the family dwelling therein. Not less than two hundred fifty cubic feet or air space shall be allowed for each person employed, and all work rooms shall be provided with sufficient means of light, heat and ventilation as may be prescribed by the chief factory inspector. It shall be the duty of local boards of health, health officers and physicians to report within twenty-four hours to the deputy factory inspector in their respective districts each and every case of contagious or infectious disease coming officially to their knowledge. The chief factory inspector or any duly appointed deputy factory inspector shall have power to seize and take charge of all articles found that are being made or partially made, finished, cleaned or repaired in unhealthy or insanitary places where there are contagious or infectious diseases, in violation of the law, and may proceed to disinfect, condemn or destroy the same as in the opinion of the local board of health officer, the public health or safety may require. Whenever it is reported to the chief factory inspector or to the state board of health, or to either of them, that any of the articles named in this section are being or have been shipped into this state, having previously been manufactured in whole or in part'under unhealthy conditions, said chief factory inspector shall examine said goods and the condition of their manufacture, and if upon such examination said goods or any of them are found to contain vermin or to have been made in improper places or under unhealthy conditions, he shall make report thereof to the state board of health, which board shall thereupon make such order or orders as the public health and safety may require: Provided, That in stores where goods are manufactured, altered or repaired, work rooms shall be provided with proper heat, light and ventilation, as prescribed in this section.

IMPROVEMENTS INSPECTORS MAY ORDER.

Section 23. Factory inspectors shall have power to order all improvements herein specified, such as the repairing of elevators, the installment of wash and dressing rooms and water closets. When such improvements are found necessary orders for same shall be served on the owner of the building or premises: Provided, That whenever the owner of such buildings or premises as mentioned in this act be a non-resident of this state said order may be made on his resident agent or the tenant of such buildings or premises. If the tenant be required to make such improvements he may deduct the cost thereof from the amount of rent for use of such buildings or premises.

This section construed in connection with section 12 of this Λct .—Barfoot v White Star Line, 170 / 349.

SEATS FOR FEMALES-NEGLECT OR REFUSAL TO PROVIDE.

Section 24. All persons who employ females in stores, shops, offices or manufactories, as clerks, assistants, operatives or helpers in any business, trade or occupation carried on or operated by them, shall be required to procure and provide proper and suitable seats for all such females, and shall permit the use of such seats, rests or stools as may be necessary, and shall not make any arbitrary rules, regulations or orders preventing the use of such stools or seats at reasonable times. No employer of female help shall neglect or refuse to provide seats as provided in this act, nor shall make any rules, orders or regulations in their shops, stores or other places of business requiring females to remain standing when not necessarily in service or labor therein.

FEMALE LABOR IN SALOON, ETC.

Section 25. No person shall employ or permit any girl or woman to act as barkeeper, or to serve liquor, or to furnish music, or for dancing in any saloon or barroom where spirituous or intoxicating liquors, or malt, brewed or fermented liquors are sold or kept for sale.

This section is deemed to supersede C. L. 1897, \$ 5361-5364, on the same subject.

FOUNDRIES, EXHAUST FANS, ETC.

Section 26. All entrances to foundries shall be constructed and maintained so as to minimize drafts. All passage ways in foundries, now in operation or hereafter to be built, shall be constructed and maintained of sufficient width to make them reasonably safe for the workmen, and no unnecessary obstruction shall be allowed in such passage ways during the hours of casting. Whenever a foundry is so constructed or operated that smoke, steam, dust or noxious gases are not promptly carried off by the general ventilation, exhaust fans shall be provided. No salamanders or open fire places shall be used, unless ample provision be made for conveying the gases arising therefrom directly from the building. Foundries shall be reasonably well lighted throughout working hours, and reasonably well heated during the cold and inclement weather. Hot water shall be kept available for washing purposes during the season in which artificial heating is necessary. When it is thought necessary and advisable by a state factory inspector, facilities shall be provided for drying the clothing of persons employed therein. All pits around furnaces in any such foundry shall be covered with substantial iron gratings. stairways around such furnaces shall be constructed of iron. There shall be kept on hand at all times in every foundry a reasonable supply of lime water, sweet oil, vaseline, bandages and absorbent cotton for use by the workmen in case of burns or accident. It is hereby made the duty of each and every state factory inspector to enforce the provisions of this section. Any place or establishment where metal castings or cores are made shall be deemed a foundry within the meaning of this act.

This section is deemed to supersede Act 152 of 1907 on the same subject.



To Provide Fans or Blowers.

Section 27. All persons, companies or corporations operating any factory or workshop, where wheels or emery belts of any description are in general use, either leather, leather covered, felt, canvas, paper, cotton, or wheels or belts rolled or coated with emery or corundum, or cotton wheels used as buffs, shall provide the same with fans or blowers or similar apparatus, which shall be placed in such a position or manner as to protect the person or persons using the same from the particles of dust produced and caused thereby, and to carry the dust arising from, or thrown off by such wheels or belts while in operation, directly to the outside of the building or to some other receptacle placed so as to receive and confine such dust: Provided, That grinding machines upon which water is used at the point of grinding contact shall be exempt from the conditions of this act: Provided further, That this act shall not apply to solid emery wheels used in saw-mills or planing-mills or other wood working establishments.

Notice to guard emery wheels in use in defendant's factory held broad enough to include wheels subsequently installed.—Kerr v. Brass Mfg. Co., 155/191.

DUTY OF PERSONS OPERATING FACTORY—CONSTRUCTION OF APPLIANCES.

Section 28. It shall be the duty of any person, company or corporation operating any such factory or workshop to provide or construct such appliances, apparatus, machinery or other things necessary to carry out the purposes of this act, as set forth in the preceding section, as follows: Each and every such wheel shall be fitted with a sheet or cast iron hood or hopper of such form and so applied to such wheel or wheels that the dust or refuse therefrom will fall from such wheels or will be thrown into such hood or hopper by centrifugal force and be carried off by the current of air into a suction pipe attached to such hood or hopper.

SUCTION PIPES, SIZE OF.

Section 29. Each and every such wheel six inches or less in diameter shall be provided with a three-inch suction pipe, wheels six inches to twenty-four inches in diameter with four-inch suction pipes, wheels from twenty-four inches to thirty-six inches in diameter with five-inch suction pipes, and all wheels larger in diameter than those stated above shall be provided each with a suction pipe not less than six inches in diameter. The suction pipe from each wheel so specified must be full size to the main trunk suction pipe, and the said main suction pipe to which smaller pipes are attached shall, in its diameter and capacity, be equal to the combined areas of such smaller pipes attached to the same, and the discharge pipe from the exhaust fan connected with such suction pipe or pipes shall be as large or larger than the suction pipe.

RATE OF SPEED FOR FANS OR BLOWERS.

Section 30. It shall be the duty of any person, company or corporation operating any such factory or workshop, to provide the necessary fans or blowers to be connected with such pipe or pipes, as above set forth, which shall be run at such rate of speed as will produce a velocity of air in such suction or discharge pipes of at least nine thousand feet per minute or an equivalent suction or pressure of air equal to raising a column of water not less than five inches high in an U-shaped tube. All branch pipes must enter the main trunk pipe at an angle of forty-five degrees or less. The main suction or trunk pipe shall be below the polishing or buffing wheels and as close to the same as possible, and be either upon the floor or beneath the floor on which the machines are placed to which such wheels are attached. All bends, turns or elbows in such pipes must be made with easy smooth surfaces having a radius in the throat of not less than two inches diameter, of the pipe on which they are connected.

WHO MAY VISIT AND INSPECT FACTORY DURING WORKING HOURS— PROSECUTIONS, ETC.

SECTION 31. It shall be the duty of any factory inspector, sheriff, constable or prosecuting attorney of any county in this state, in which any such factory or workshop is situated, upon receiving notice in writing, signed by any person or persons having knowledge of such facts, that such factory or workshop is not provided with such appliances as herein provided for, to visit any such factory or workshop and inspect the same, and for such purpose they are hereby authorized to enter any factory or workshop in this state during working hours, and upon ascertaining the facts that the proprietors or managers of such factories or workshops have failed to comply with the provisions of this act, to make complaint of the same in writing before a justice of the peace or police magistrate having jurisdiction, who shall thereupon issue his warrant directed to the owner, manager or director of such factory or workshop, who shall be thereupon proceeded against for the violation of this act as hereinafter mentioned, and it is made the duty of the prosecuting attorney to prosecute all cases under this act. No person shall be employed to operate any of the wheels, buffers or belts mentioned in this act in any basement, so-called, or in any room lying wholly or partly beneath the surface of the ground, unless such workroom shall be provided with sufficient means of light, heat and ventilation as shall be prescribed by the state factory inspector. No female shall be employed in operating or using any of the wheels or belts specified in this section.

MACHINES TO CARRY AWAY DUST.

Section 32. All persons, companies or corporations operating any upholstering or mattress establishments or other establishments, factory or place where hair, moss, tow or cotton is used for filling, shall provide the same with hair picking machines when ordered by the commissioner, deputy commissioner of labor or deputy factory inspector, which shall be placed in such a position or manner as to carry away the dust arising from or thrown off by such machines while in operation directly to the outside of the building or to some other receptacle established so as to receive and confine such dust, and the same shall be placed within such establishment, place or factory within three months after having been ordered to be so placed by the commissioner, deputy commissioner of labor or deputy factory inspector.

This section is deemed to supersede Act 252 of 1907 on the same subject.

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STATIONARY STEAM BOILERS—APPROVAL INSPECTION.

Section 33. All stationary steam boilers operated or used, or caused to be operated or used, by any person, firm or corporation within the state of Michigan, shall, whenever so ordered by the chief factory inspector or any of his duly authorized deputies, have upon them some device which will sound an alarm for the purpose of calling the attention of the engineer, fireman or person in charge of any such boiler to the depth of water in the boiler before the same reaches the danger point: Provided, That the kind of device or alarm used shall be approved by the chief factory inspector of the state; and he or any of the duly authorized deputies shall be authorized to enter upon the premises of any person, firm or corporation within this state for the purpose of inspecting any stationary steam boiler so used or operated.

This and the next section are deemed to supersede Act 209, of 1899, on the same subject.

LOW WATER ALARM, OPERATION WITHOUT UNLAWFUL.

SECTION 34. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate any stationary steam boiler without its having a low water alarm attached thereto, after the chief factory inspector or any duly authorized deputy has ordered the same to be used as specified in this act.

FREE EMPLOYMENT BUREAUS, CREATION OF.

Free employment bureaus are hereby authorized to be created and established in this state as follows: One in the city of Detroit, one in the city of Grand Rapids, one in the city of Jackson, one in the city of Bay City, one in the city of Battle Creek, one in the city of Muskegon, one in the city of Saginaw, one in the city of Flint, one in the city of Kalamazoo, one in the city of Lansing, one in the city of Bad Axe, one in the city of St. Louis and one in the city of Traverse City, for the purpose of receiving applications of persons seeking employment and applications of persons seeking to employ labor. Such bureaus shall be designated and known as Michigan free employment bureaus. The commissioner of labor shall organize, establish and control the free employment bureaus authorized by this act. No compensation or fee shall be charged or received directly or indirectly from persons applying for employment or help through any such bureau. It shall be the duty of said commissioner of labor to use all diligence in securing the cooperation of employers of labor with the purpose and objects of said employment bureau. To this end it shall be competent for said commissioner to advertise in the columns of newspapers or to use other mediums for such situations as he or his agents have applicants to fill, and for such help as may be called for by employers. Said commissioner of labor may also advertise in a general way for the co-operation of large contractors and employers, in such trade journals or special publications as reach such employers, whether such trade journals are published in the state of Michigan or not, and he may pursue such other methods as in his judgment will best tend to accomplish the purpose of this act: Provided, That all managers or superintendents in charge of state free



employment bureaus shall devote their entire time to the work of their office while receiving salary or wages from the state.

ASSISTANTS, COMPENSATION, How PAID.

Section 36. The commissioner of labor is authorized to appoint such assistants as may be necessary for the proper administration of such free employment bureaus. All such assistants shall be under the control and direction of the commissioner of labor, and shall receive such compensation as he shall determine. All compensation for services and expenses provided for in this act, except the compensation allowed to the commissioner and his deputy, shall be paid from the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars hereinafter appropriated under the provisions of section thirty-seven of this act. Such compensation and services shall be paid by the state treasurer upon the warrant of the auditor general in the same manner as other salaries and expenses are paid.

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION.

Section 37. The sum of sixty-five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending June thirty, nineteen hundred eighteen, and for each fiscal year thereafter there is hereby appropriated the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars for the maintenance and support of said department of labor, and the auditor general is hereby directed to annually add to and incorporate in the state tax to be levied each year the sum of sixty-five thousand dollars, which, when collected, shall be credited to the general fund to reimburse the same for the money appropriated by this act.

PENALTY.

SECTION 54. Any person who violates or omits to comply with any of the foregoing provisions of this act, or who interferes in any manner with the factory inspector in the discharge of his duties, or who suffers or permits any child or female to be employed in violation of its provisions, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not less than ten nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 55 repeals "all acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith."

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PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES.

AN ACT to provide for the licensing, bonding and regulation of private employment agencies, the limiting of the amount of the fee charged by such agencies, the refunding of such fees in certain cases, the imposing of obligations on persons, firms or corporations which have induced workmen to travel in the hope of securing employment, charging the commissioner of labor with the enforcement of this act and empowering him to make rules and regulations, and fixing penalties for the violation hereof.

[Act 301, P. A. 1913.]

LICENSE REQUIRED—FEE—DISPOSITION OF FEES.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

SECTION 1. No person, firm or corporation in this state shall open, operate or maintain a private employment agency where a fee is charged to persons seeking employment, without first obtaining a license for the same from the commissioner of labor, and the fee for such license shall be twenty-five dollars per annum except in cities over two hundred thousand population, where it shall be one hundred dollars per annum. Every license shall be void after the thirty-first day of December of the year in which it was issued. The form of the license shall be fixed by the commissioner of labor and it shall be non-transferable. The license may be revoked by the commissioner of labor whenever in his judgment, after full hearing the licensed agency shall have violated any of the provisions of this act. The commissioner of labor is hereby charged with the enforcement of the terms of this act and empowered to make such rules or regulations as are consistent with it and aid in its enforcement and he shall direct copies or excerpts of this act to be kept conspicuously posted in every licensed agency. The commissioner of labor shall turn into the state treasury all fees collected under this act.

SURETY BOND REQUIRED.

Section 2. The commissioner of labor, before granting a license, shall require each applicant to furnish a surety bond in the penal sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned that the obligor will not violate any of the provisions of this act. Such bond shall be a personal bond with two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the prosecuting attorney or the circuit judge of the county in which such employment agency is located and when so approved shall be accepted by the commissioner of labor. The commissioner of labor is authorized to cause an action to be brought on said bond in the name of the people of the state of Michigan for the violation of any of its conditions. If any person shall be aggrieved because of the violation by such licensed agency of any provision of this act, such person may maintain an action, in his own name, upon the bond

of said employment agency in any court having jurisdiction of the amount claimed.

REGISTERS TO BE KEPT.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of every licensed agency to keep a register in which shall be truthfully entered the date of application, age, sex, nativity, trade or occupation, name and address of every person who applies for employment at such agency, the amount of the fee charged and the wages to be paid. Such licensed agency shall also keep a register in which shall be truthfully entered the name and address of every person who applies for help at such agency, the place of proposed employment, the nature of the work to be done and the wages offered.

RECEIPTS.

Section 4. Every licensed agency shall issue a receipt to each person seeking employment who has paid a fee, which receipt shall contain the name and address of the agency issuing it, together with all the information regarding the particular transaction hereinbefore required to be entered in both registers of the agency. Such agency shall also issue a receipt to each person seeking employment who has paid a fee for registering in such agency.

FEE, LIMIT OF-REPAYMENT.

Section 5. The entire fee or fees for the procuring of one situation or job and for all expenses, incidental thereto, to be received by and employment agency, from any applicant for employment at any time, whether for registration or other purposes, shall not exceed ten per cent of the first month's wages. Such ten per cent shall be determined by the monthly rate offered by the applicant for help, regardless of the time during which the applicant for employment remains at the employment procured him. Where a registration fee is charged, if the applicant, through no fault of his own, does not secure through the employment agency to which the fee has been paid, within one month, the employment applied for, said agency shall repay to said applicant, upon demand, one-half the full amount of the registration fee paid. No registration fee shall exceed the sum of one dollar.

THINGS PROHIBITED.

SECTION 6. No employment agent or agency shall send an applicant for employment to an employer who has not applied to such agent or agency for help or labor. Nor shall any licensed agency fraudulently promise or deceive, whether through a false notice or advertisement or other means, any applicant for help or employment with regard to the service to be rendered by such licensed agency and every such agency shall be liable civilly to any person who is led to expend money uselessly for transportation or other purposes through the misrepresentations or false promises of such agency.

OTHER THINGS PROHIBITED.

Section 7. No employment agency or person connected therewith shall direct any person applying for employment to any house of prostitution or immoral resort. No licensed agency shall be conducted in, or in connection with, any place where intoxicating liquors are sold.

PENALTY.

Section 8. Any person who violates or omits to comply with any provision of this act, or who interferes in any manner with the commissioner of labor or any of his deputies in its enforcement shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not less than ten or more than ninety days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

HOTELS.

AN ACT relating to the conduct of hotels, inns and public lodging houses
[Act 188, P. A. 1913.]

HOTEL DEFINED.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Section 1. Every building or structure kept, used or maintained as, or held out to the public to be an inn, hotel or public lodging house, shall, for the purpose of this act, be defined as a hotel, and wherever the word "hotel" shall occur in this act it shall be construed to mean every such structure as is described in this section.

FIRE ESCAPES—WAY OF EGRESS UNOBSTRUCTED.

Section 2. Every hotel that is more than two stories high shall be equipped with an iron fire escape on the outside of the building connecting on each floor, above the first, with at least two openings, which shall be well fastened and secured with landings not less than six feet in length and three feet in width, guarded by an iron railing not less than three feet in height. Such landings shall be connected by iron stairs not less than two feet wide and with steps of not less than six-inch tread and not more than eight-inch rise, placed at an angle of not more than forty-five degrees and protected by a well secured hand rail on both sides and reaching to within twelve feet of the ground, with a drop ladder eighteen inches wide reaching from the lower platform to the ground. Such fire escapes shall be sufficient if a perpendicular ladder shall be used instead of the stairs, provided such iron ladder is placed at the extreme outside of the platform and at least three feet away from the wall of the building, and provided said ladder is equipped with round iron rounds not more



than fifteen inches apart, except that fire-proof buildings may have inside fire escapes placed in a well, shaft, or opening which shall be built of fire-proof material and shut off from the remainder of the building by fire-proof, tight doors. The way of egress to such fire escape shall at all times be kept free and clear of all obstruction of any and every nature. Storm windows and storm doors shall be considered an obstruction for the purpose of this act, and such way of egress shall at all times be kept unlocked. There shall be posted and maintained in a conspicuous place in each hall and each guest room, except the halls and rooms on the ground floor, of such hotel, a printed notice in characters not less than two inches high calling attention to and directing the way to such fire escape.

CHEMICAL FIRE EXTINGUISHERS.

SECTION 3. Each and every hotel shall be provided with at least one sufficient chemical fire extinguisher for every twenty-five hundred square feet or less of floor area, which such extinguisher or extinguishers shall be placed in a convenient location in a public hallway outside of the sleeping rooms, and shall always be in condition for use.

BUILDINGS TWO STORIES OR LESS TO PROVIDE MANILA ROPES.

Section 4. Every hotel that is not over two stories in height and which is not provided with such fire escape as is described in section two hereof, shall provide in every bedroom or sleeping apartment on the second floor a manila rope at least five eighths of an inch in diameter and knotted every eighteen inches, and of sufficient strength to sustain a weight and strain of at least five hundred pounds, and of sufficient length to reach the ground. Such rope shall be securely fastened to the joists or studdings of the building as near the windows as practicable, and shall be kept coiled in plain sight at all times, nor shall such rope be covered by curtains or other obstructions. Every such hotel shall provide and maintain in a conspicuous place in every bedroom or sleeping apartment above the ground floors, a printed notice calling attention to such rope and giving directions for its use.

SANITATION, DRAINAGE, ETC.

Section 5. Every hotel shall be well drained and maintained according to established sanitary principles; shall be kept clean and in a sanitary condition and free from effluvia arising from any sewer, drain, privy or other source within the control of the owner, manager, agent or other person in charge; shall be provided with water closets or privies properly screened for the separate use of males and females, which water closets or privies shall be disinfected as often as may be necessary to keep them at all times in a sanitary condition.

Rooms, How Furnished.

Section 6. Every hotel shall have and provide all toilet rooms, bath rooms and sleeping rooms with individual textile towels. Every hotel shall have and provide all beds with regulation sheets, not less than ninety inches in length. Such beds shall also be provided with sufficient

number of regulation size blankets or quilts that are kept in a sanitary condition.

VIOLATION, PENALTY.

SECTION 7. Every owner, manager, agent or person in charge of a hotel, who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days, or both, and every day that such a hotel is carried on in violation of this act shall constitute a separate offense.

POWER OF COMMISSION.

Section 8. The labor commissioner, dairy and food commissioner, insurance commissioner, and the executive officer of the state board of health shall constitute a commission for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this act, and same shall be delegated with the power to adopt such rules and regulations as conditions may require.

HOTEL INSPECTOR AND DEPUTY INSPECTORS.

SECTION 9. Such commission shall delegate and confer the title of hotel inspector or deputy inspectors upon such men now operating under the supervision of the several departments constituting this commission and in such number as the lawful enforcement of this act shall justify.

DUTIES OF HOTEL INSPECTOR AND DEPUTIES.

SECTION 10. It shall be the duty of the inspector and his deputies to see that all of the provisions of this act are complied with, and said inspector or the deputy for the district shall personally inspect at least once each year and at such other times as in the best judgment of the commission or the deputy the occasion demands as defined by this act.

POWER GRANTED HOTEL INSPECTOR AND DEPUTIES.

SECTION 11. Said inspector and his deputies are hereby granted police power to enter any hotel at reasonable hours to determine whether the provisions of this act are being complied with.

CERTIFICATE, WHERE POSTED.

Section 12. If the inspector or deputy shall find after examination of any hotel that this law has been fully complied with, he shall issue a certificate to that effect to the person operating the same, and said certificate shall be kept posted up in a conspicuous place in said inspected building. Such certificate shall be prepared in blank by said commission.

FALSE CERTIFICATION, PENALTY For.

Section 13. Any inspector who shall wilfully certify falsely regarding any building inspected by him, and who shall issue a certificate to any



person operating in any hotel when such person has not complied with the provisions of this act, shall on conviction thereof be fined not less than fifty dollars nor to exceed one hundred dollars, and may be imprisoned not to exceed ninety days in the county jail, or both at the discretion of the court, and upon conviction shall be forever disqualified to hold said office.

HINDRANCE OF INSPECTOR, PENALTY FOR.

SECTION 14. Any owner, manager, agent or person in charge of a hotel, who shall obstruct or hinder an inspector in the proper discharge of his duties under this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or shall be imprisoned in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days, or both.

PROSECUTIONS.

SECTION 15. It shall be the duty of the inspector, upon ascertaining by inspection or otherwise, that after sixty days from the time this act takes effect, any hotel is being carried on contrary to its provisions, to make complaint and cause the arrest of the person so violating the same; and it shall be the duty of the prosecuting attorney in such cases to prepare all necessary papers and conduct such prosecutions.

[Act No. 177 of the Public Acts of 1913.]

REGULATING THE OPERATION OF COAL MINES.

AN ACT to provide for the health and safety of persons employed in and about the coal mines of Michigan, for the appointment, qualifications, duties and compensation of an inspector of mines, and for the protection and preservation of property connected therewith, and to provide penalties for the violation thereoff, and for the repeal of all acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

SECTION 1. For the purposes of this act, the terms and definitions contained herein shall be as follows:

Mine. In this act the term "Mine" includes the shafts, slopes and drifts connected with excavations penetrating the coal stratum or strata, which excavations are ventilated by one general air current, or divisions thereof, and connected by one general system of mine railroads, over which coal may be delivered to one or more points outside the mine, when such is operated by one operator.

Excavations and Workings. The term "Excavations and Workings" includes all the excavated portions of a mine, those abandoned, as well as the places actually being worked; also all underground workings and shafts, slopes, tunnels and other openings in the course of being sunk

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or driven, together with all roads, appliances, machinery and material connected with the same below the surface.

Shaft. The term "Shaft" means a vertical opening through the strata that is or may be used for the purpose of ventilation or drainage, or for hoisting men, coal or material, or both, in connection with the mining of coal.

Slope. The term "Slope" means an incline or opening used for the same purpose as a shaft.

Operator. The term "Operator" means any firm, corporation or in-

dividual operating any coal mine, or any part thereof.

Superintendent. The term "Superintendent" means the person who shall have, on behalf of the operator, immediate supervision of one or more mines.

Mine Foreman. The term "Mine Foreman" means the person whom the operator or superintendent shall place in charge of the inside workings of the mine and of the persons employed therein.

Inspector. The term "Inspector" means the person commissioned by the commissioner of labor to have supervision of the mines as hereinafter prescribed.

Mine Committee. The term "Mine Committee" means men employed to represent the miners.

APPOINTMENT OF MINE INSPECTOR.

Section 2. An inspector of coal mines shall be appointed by the commissioner of labor, subject to the approval of the governor of the State, who shall have had at least eight years' experience in the mine, three years of which he was employed in mining and loading coal, and he shall not, while in office, be interested as owner, operator, agent, director or otherwise interested in any coal mine, gas, oil or other mining interest, directly or indirectly, or in any way whatever be connected with a miners' organization during his term of office, and he must have been a resident of the State at least five years before his appointment to office, and shall receive as a salary for his services the sum of four dollars per day, and in addition thereto shall be allowed an amount not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars for traveling expenses per year. The inspector shall present all bills for traveling expenses to the commissioner of labor, and the same shall be approved by him before being presented to the board of state auditors for allowance. The salary and expense of the inspector shall be paid semi-monthly from the general fund of the State upon warrants drawn by the auditor general.

POLICE POWERS OF INSPECTOR.

Section 3. The inspector of mines is hereby empowered to act as police officer with full power to arrest and detain any person found violating any provisions of this act, or engaged in any attempt to violate this law or any part thereof, or against whom there is found any evidence of a previous violation of this law: Provided, however, That no such person shall be detained for any period of time longer than twenty-four hours without warrant or the filing of a charge against him in a court of competent jurisdiction. Such inspector shall also have the power to imme-

diately stop the operation of any coal mine, or part thereof, in which any dangerous or unlawful condition is found: Provided, however, That where conditions exist justifying him to do so, he may grant a reasonable length of time for making necessary repairs. And provided further, That where any stop is enforced, such inspector shall have the power to subsequently allow such mine, or part of mine to be re-opened when the dangerous or unlawful conditions have been remedied, or removed so that they no longer exist.

AUTHORITY TO ENTER.

SECTION 4. It shall be lawful for the inspector of mines to enter, examine and inspect at any and all seasonable times, by day or by night, but so as not to unreasonably obstruct or hinder the working of such coal mine, and the operator of every such coal mine is hereby required to allow free access for making such examination and inspection.

POSTING NOTICES.

SECTION 5. The result of all coal mine inspections made by the inspector of the mines, showing all his conclusions as to the condition or safety of the mines and orders given in the inspection of any coal mine, shall be posted in writing at the entrance to such mine immediately upon the conclusion of each inspection, and he shall furnish a copy of such report to the mine office, and also to the mine committee. The inspector of mines shall make personal inspection of all coal mines in the State at least four times each year.

INSPECTOR OF WEIGHTS.

Section 6. The State coal mine inspector shall be ex-officio inspector of weights, measures and scales used at coal mines, and he is hereby empowered and it shall be his duty to test all the scales, correctly measure the weight of such coal, and if defects or irregularities are found in such scales, which prevent correct weights and measurements, the inspector shall call the attention of the mine owner, agent or operator to such defects, and shall direct the same to be at once properly adjusted and corrected.

TEST WEIGHTS.

SECTION 7. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act, the State inspector shall be furnished by the State with a complete set of standard weights, suitable for testing the accuracy of track scales and of all smaller scales at mines. Such test weights shall remain in the custody of the inspector for use at any point within the State, and for any amounts expended by him for storage, transportation or handling of the same, he shall be fully reimbursed upon making entry of the proper items in his expense voucher.

WEIGHMEN TO MAKE OATH.

SECTION 8. All weighmen who shall perform the duty of weighing coal shall be sworn by some one competent to administer a legal oath, that

they will perform their duty accurately and impartially as between employers and employe, and that they will honestly report and record all weights of coal with which they are entrusted. The coal mine employes shall have the right to name a competent and fair check weighman, who shall be paid by the employes and be sworn by one authorized to administer oaths.

MAP OF MINES, COPIES FURNISHED MINE INSPECTOR, SURVEYS ORDERED, WHEN.

Section 9. The owner, operator, lessee or person in charge of any coal mine, shall make or cause to be made an accurate map or plan of such mine, drawn to a scale of not more than two hundred feet to the inch, on which shall appear the name of the state, county and township in which the mine is located, the designation of the mine, the name of the company or owner, operator, lessee or person in charge, the eertificate of the mining engineer or surveyor as to the accuracy and date of the survey, the north point and the scale to which the drawing is made. Every such map or plan shall correctly show the surface, boundary lines of the coal rights pertaining to each mine, and all sections or quarter section lines or corners within the same; the lines of town lots and streets; the tracks and sidetracks of all railroads, the location of all wagon roads, rivers, streams, ponds. For the underground workings said map shall show all shafts, slopes, tunnels, or other openings to the surface or to the workings of a continuous mine, all excavations, entries, rooms and crosscuts; the location of the escape ways, and of the fan or other means of ventilation, and the direction of air currents and the location of permanent pumps, hauling engines, engine plans, abandoned work, fire walls and standing water. A separate and similar map drawn to the same scale in all cases, shall be made of each and every seam of coal operated in any mine in this State. A separate map shall also be made of the surface whenever the surface buildings, lines or objects are so numerous as to obscure the details of the mine workings, if drawn upon the same sheet with them, and in such case the surface map shall be drawn upon transparent cloth or paper, so that it can be laid upon the map of the underground workings and thus truly indicate the local relations of lines and objects on the surface to the excavations of the mine, together with any other principal workings of the mine. The original or true copies of all such maps shall be kept at the office of the mine, and true copies thereof shall also be furnished the State inspector of coal mines within thirty days after the completion of the same. The maps so delivered to the inspector shall be the property of the State, and shall remain in the custody of the commissioner of labor during his term of office, and be delivered to his successor in office. They shall be kept at the office of the commissioner of labor, and be open to examination of all persons interested in the same, but such examination shall be made only in the presence of the inspector, commissioner of labor, or his office assistant; no copies of the same to be made without the written consent of the operator or owner of the property, except as herein otherwise provided. An accurate extension of the last preceding survey of every mine in active operation shall be made in every twelve months prior to July first of every year, and the result of

such survey, with the date thereof, shall be promptly and accurately entered upon the original map; and a true, correct and accurate copy of said extended map shall be forwarded to the inspector of coal mines so as to show all changes in plan of new work in the mine, and all extensions of old workings to the most advanced face or boundary of said workings which have been made since the last preceding survey; and the parts of the mine abandoned or worked out after the last preceding survev shall be clearly indicated and shown by colorings, which copy must be delivered to such inspector of coal mines within thirty days after the last survey is made. When any coal mine is worked out or is about to be abandoned, or indefinitely closed, the owner, operator, lessee or person in charge of the same shall make or cause to be made a complete and extended map of said mine, and the result of the same shall be duly extended on all maps of the mine and copies thereof so as to show all excavations and the most advanced workings of the mine and their exact relations to the boundary or section lines on the surface, and deliver to the inspector a copy of the completed map. The State coal mine inspector shall order a survey to be made of the workings of any mine and the result to be extended on the maps of the same, and the copies thereof, whenever in his judgment the safety of the working man, or the safety of an adjoining mine requires it; and if not made by the owner, operator, lessee or person in charge when ordered by the inspector, it shall be made or caused to be made by the inspector and paid for by the State, and the amount collected from the owner, operator, lessee or person in charge, as other debts are collected.

ABANDONED MINES.

Section 10. When approaching abandoned workings and when within not less than sixty feet of the same, the excavation in approaching the said workings shall not exceed eight feet in width, and there shall be constantly kept one bore hole near the center not less than twenty feet in advance, and one flank bore hole on each side, of not less than fifteen feet in length.

VENTILATION.

Section 11. For the purpose of ventilation the mines shall be furnished with not less than one hundred cubic feet of air per minute for each person employed in the mine, or three hundred cubic feet of air per minute for each machine, mule or other draught animal in the mine, the measurements to be made at any point of the intake airways. The amount of air shall be so distributed as to give all employes air of reasonable purity to keep the working places in a healthy condition, free from noxious gases and deleterious air, and no more than one hundred men to work on any split of air. In mines generating explosive gas of a sufficient quantity to be detected by an ordinary safety lamp, the quantity shall not be less than two hundred cubic feet of air per minute for each person and six hundred cubic feet for each machine, mule or other draught animal, and the mine shall be operated with locked safety lamps and examined by a competent person each morning before the men enter their working places.

Doors, Breakthroughs and Brattices.

Section 12. Doors, curtains or brattices shall be placed in such places as may be designated by the mine manager. All doors set on entries, for the purpose of conducting ventilation shall be made sufficiently tight to effectually obstruct the air current. Breakthroughs shall be made every sixty feet, first breakthrough in rooms not to exceed thirty feet from entry; all breakthroughs must be not less than five feet wide at any point in said breakthrough. It shall be the duty of mine owners to close, or caused to be closed, all entry breakthroughs with air-tight brattices with the exception of the one nearest the working place of the employes, or two if necessary, no obstruction of any kind to be placed in the breakthrough nearest the working place. Curtains shall not be permanently used on entries or airways without the written consent of the State inspector of coal mines.

PURITY OF OILS.

Only pure animal or vegetable oil or other means for SECTION 13. illuminating purposes equally as safe and free from smoke or offensive odor shall be used in any coal mine in this State; and for the purpose of determining the purity of oils the State board of health shall fix the standard of purity of the said oils and establish regulations for testing the same, and when so determined and established it shall be recognized by all of the courts of this State. And in any case when any material, substance or other means of illuminating is used for illuminating purposes, as by this act contemplated, any refuse part thereof remaining after use which gives off any gas or offensive odor shall, by the person using it, be removed from the mine at the end of his day's work. Any person, firm or corporation, either by themselves, agents or employes selling or offering to sell for illuminating purposes in any mine in this State any adulterated or impure oil, or oil not recognized by the State board of health as suitable for illuminating purposes, or other substance to be used for illuminating purposes not equally as safe and free from smoke or offensive odor as oils contemplated by this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense; and any mine owner, lessee, operator or employe thereof who shall knowingly use, or any mine owner, lessee or operator who shall knowingly permit to be used for illuminating purposes in any mine in this State, any impure or adulterated oil or any oil or other means of illuminating, the use of which is forbidden by this act, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twentyfive dollars.

REGULATIONS FOR OIL.

SECTION 14. The oiling or greasing of cars inside of any mine is strictly prohibited, unless the place where said oil or grease is used is thoroughly cleaned at least once each working day to prevent the accumulation of waste oil or grease on the roads or in the drains at that point. Not more than two barrels of lubricating oil shall be permitted in any mine at one time, and it shall be kept in a fireproof building, cut

out of a solid rock, or made of masonry or concrete of sufficient thickness to insure safety in case of fire. But this shall not prevent a sufficient quantity of oil being sent in for machines.

ELECTRICITY.

Section 15. In all coal mines in this State where electricity is or shall be used as a part of the system power or means of mining and securing the coal from said mine, the wiring shall be carefully and thoroughly insulated or protected, except trolley and negative wires, so that the person or animals coming in contact therewith shall not be injured thereby.

GASOLINE ENGINES, LOCATION, APPROVAL, HAND FIRE EXTINGUISHERS.

Section 16. Where gasoline engines are used in the coal mines, the exhaust must be properly cared for, and all gasoline pumps shall be placed in such a position that the fumes from the pumps will not vitiate the air or injure the health of the employes. The supply of gasoline required for the operation of said pump or engine shall not exceed one day's supply, and shall be taken into the mine only in sealed metal tanks, so constructed that the oil supply can be changed without pouring the oil from one tank to another. At all hoisting shafts, air shafts, escape shafts and places of exit, boiler and engine rooms, stables in mines and places where gasoline engines are used, there shall be kept ready for use at all times at least two good hand fire extinguishers, conveniently placed for immediate use when needed.

BOILER AND ENGINE ROOM LOCATION.

Section 17. All boiler and engine rooms to be located or constructed on the surface at any mine, from and after the enactment of this act, shall be constructed of non-combustible material, except rafters, roof-boards, studding and coal bins, which shall be kept whitewashed; and in no case shall the boiler room be placed within less than sixty feet of the hoisting shaft, slope or drift, and no obstructions shall be placed between the engine room or hoisting shaft, so as to obstruct the view of the engineer.

INFLAMMABLE BUILDINGS.

SECTION 18. It shall be unlawful to erect any inflammable building within one hundred feet of the fan house, and in any building erected between fan house and hoisting shaft no explosives shall be stored.

WASH HOUSES.

Section 19. For the protection of the health of the employes hereinafter mentioned, it shall be the duty of the owner, operator, lessee, superintendent of, or other person in charge of every coal mine, at the request in writing of twenty or more employes of such mine, or in event there are less than twenty men employed, then, upon the written request of one-third of the number of emloyes employed, to provide a suitable wash room or wash house for the use of persons employed, so that they

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may change their clothing before beginning work and wash themselves and change their clothing after working. Said room shall be separate from the engine or boiler room, and shall be maintained in good order, be properly lighted and heated and be provided with clean, cold and warm water.

TIME FOR CONSTRUCTING ESCAPE SHAFTS OR OTHER EXITS.

SECTION 20. In all mines there shall be allowed six months to make escape shafts or other means of exit, as provided by law, the time to date in all cases from hoisting of coal from main shaft, slope or drift, but not more than twenty-five persons shall be employed in such mine at any time until the provision of the law relating to escape shafts, or other means of exit, shall have been complied with, and after the expiration of the period above mentioned, it shall not be operated until made to conform to the provisions of law with reference to the escape shaft or other means of exit.

Two Places of Egress.

Section 21. The owner, operator, lessee or person in charge of any mine hereafter constructed and operated by shaft, or one having a slope or drift opening in which five or more persons are employed, shall construct and maintain at least two distinct openings, which in mines operated by shaft shall be separated by natural strata of not less than three hundred feet in breadth, and in mines operated by slope or drift, not less than two hundred feet in breadth, to which ingress and egress at all times shall be unobstructed to the employes and persons having occasion to use the same as escape ways or place of exit from the mine.

ESCAPE SHAFTS EQUIPPED WITH STAIRWAY—HOW CONSTRUCTED.

SECTION 22. All escape shafts hereafter constructed not provided with hoisting appliances as hereinafter provided, shall have stairs at an angle of not more than forty-five degrees in ascent, nor less than eighteen inches wide in the clear, with proper, safe and substantial landing at convenient and easy distances and equipped with good and substantial hand rails or banisters. If shaft be used for an escape shaft and air shaft, that part of the shaft used as an escape way shall be divided and partitioned closely with good and substantial material from the part used as an air shaft, all of which shall be kept in a safe condition as by this act provided.

ESCAPE SHAFT EQUIPPED WITH HOISTING APPARATUS.

Section 23. All escape shafts not provided with stairs shall be provided with suitable appliances for hoisting underground workmen, ready for use at all times, both day and night, while the workmen are at labor, which hoisting apparatus shall be separate and apart from the hoisting shaft, and the equipment shall include a depth indicator brake on the drum, steel or iron cage, safety catches on cages and covers on cages to securely protect any person while on the cage.



TRAVELING WAYS—How CONSTRUCTED—SIGN BOARDS.

SECTION 24. In any mine affected by this act, and every seam of coal worked therein there shall be constructed, kept and maintained, safe and accessible traveling ways from the escape ways or place of exit to main haulage roads, which shall be maintained free from falls of roof, standing water, or other obstructions. At all points where the passage or traveling ways to the escapement shaft or place of exit intersect other road ways or entries, conspicuous sign boards shall be placed thereat; indicating the way to such place of exit.

ESCAPE WAYS KEPT FREE FROM FOUL AIR, ICE AND OBSTRUCTIONS.

SECTION 25. The escape way shall be ventilated and kept free from vitiated air, accumulations of ice and obstructions of every kind; nor shall steam or heated air be discharged therein during the day time, unless an attendant be kept in charge thereof and the equipment so arranged that the steam or warm air may be readily turned off at any time when required, and a conspicuous sign board placed in plain view, indicating the point where the steam or warm air may be turned off, as by this act contemplated; and all surface or other water which flows therein, shall be conducted by rings or otherwise to receptacles for the same so as to keep the stairway reasonably free from falling water.

LIGHTS AT THE TOP AND OPENING OF SHAFT.

Section 26. In all cases, after twilight, or when by reason of steam or other causes obscuring the plain view of the top or opening of any shaft, there shall be maintained a good and substantial light, but in no case shall an open light or torch be used.

TRAVELING WAY AROUND BOTTOM OF HOISTING SHAFT.

SECTION 27. At the bottom of each hoisting shaft there shall be constructed a safe and convenient traveling way around the shaft for employes and animals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to pass across the shaft bottom in any other manner or in any other way than the traveling way herein contemplated, except such employes as may be necessary to perform the work at the bottom of the shaft or those engaged in making repairs.

STABLE LOCATION—CONSTRUCTION—NOT USED FOR STORAGE PURPOSES.

SECTION 28. The owner, operator, lessee, or person in charge of any mine shall not be allowed to locate any stable at a point in any mine where the air current supplied to the employes passes through such place. The materials used in the construction of the stables herein contemplated shall, as near as practicable, be incombustible, and such stables shall not be used as a place for storing, nor shall any inflammable material be stored therein, except such hay as may be necessary for one day's use, except in case of emergency.



PLACES OF REFUGE—SIGNALS—LIGHTS.

SECTION 29. On all single track haulage roads, where haulage is done by machinery, which roads the persons employed in the mine must use, while traveling on foot to and from their work, there shall be places of refuge on one side not less than three feet in depth from the side of the car, and not less than five feet long and not less than the height of the entry as driven and not more than sixty feet apart. On rope haulage roads means of signaling shall be established between the haulage engines at all points on the road. A conspicuous light must be carried on the front of every trip or train of such cars moved by machinery. On all haulage roads on which the hauling is done by draught animals whereon men are obliged to pass to and from their work, there shall be places of refuge not less than three feet in width from the side of the car and not less than five feet long and not less than the height of the entry as driven, and not more than sixty feet apart. Refuge places shall not be required in the entries on which room necks are turned at regular intervals not exceeding sixty feet apart, which furnished required refuge places. All places of refuge must be kept clear of obstruction, except supports, and no materials shall be stored or be allowed to accumulate therein.

MEANS OF COMMUNICATIONS—SAFETY APPLIANCES, ETC.

Section 30. The operator or superintendent shall provide and maintain from the top to the bottom of every shaft where persons are raised or lowered, a metal tube suitably adapted to the free passage of sound, through which conversation may be held between persons at the top and bottom of said shaft, and also means of signaling from the top to to the bottom thereof, and shall provide every cage used for the hoisting or lowering of persons, with a sufficient overhead covering to protect these persons when using the same, and shall provide also for each said cage a safety catch approved by the mine inspector and to be tested by drop quarterly. The said operator or superintendent shall see that flanges with sufficient clearance, when the rope is wound around the drum, to prevent the rope slipping off the drum of every engine that is used for lowering and hoisting persons to and out of the mine, are used, and also, that adequate brakes are attached to the drums: Provided. That the rope shall be left around the drum at least one and one half times when the cage is at the bottom of the shaft. Safety gates, to be approved by the mine superintendent, shall be so placed as to prevent persons from falling into the shaft. The ropes, chains and machinery, and all its connections used for lowering or raising the employes into or out of the mines shall be kept in a safe condition and inspected once every twenty-four hours by a competent person provided by the mine operator for that purpose, who shall make a daily record of such inspection in a book provided for that purpose, and such machinery and the method of its inspection shall be approved by the mine inspector.



SAFETY IN HOISTING MEN.

SECTION 31. Hoisting and Lowering Men. Every cage on which persons are carried must be fitted with iron bars or rings in proper place and sufficient number to furnish a secure hand-hold for every person permitted to ride thereon, and not more than ten persons shall be allowed to descend or ascend in any cage at one time, or such less number as may be fixed by the mine inspector. No person at any time shall be allowed to ride in the shaft or on any cage with a car, tools or other material or when such car, tools or material is on the opposite cage, except when absolutely necessary in the performance of work in the making of repairs; and no person shall ride upon a loaded trip while in any part of the mine, except the person or persons in charge thereof. Cages on which employes are riding shall not be lifted or lowered at a rate of speed greater than four hundred feet per minute.

COMPETENT AND SOBER ENGINEERS—DUTIES.

SECTION 32. The owner, operator or lessee or any person in charge of any mine shall not place in charge of any engine in and around the mine, any but competent and sober engineers, who shall not permit any person but those designated to handle, operate, or interfere with it or any part of the machinery, except such as may be necessary in making proper and needed repairs, and no person shall be permitted to talk to the engineer while in the performance of his duty in hoisting or lowering employes, coal or mineral. There shall be placed in plain view of the engineer while at his post of duty, at some conspicuous point, a code of signals as by this act provided, and which shall be in like manner placed at the top and bottom of the shaft, slope or drift; and it shall be the duty of the engineer at least once each day to carefully inspect all of the machinery and apparatus under his charge, and carefully note all of its parts, and if any defects appear which will endanger the life or limb of any employe in the use thereof, he shall cease operating the machinery until the defects are corrected.

CODE OF SIGNALS.

SECTION 33. One bell: Hoist cage, stop cage when in motion.

Two bells: Lower cage.

Three bells: Hoist car of dirt.

Four bells: Men and cage ready to be hoisted; cage must always be stopped at landing on four bells.

Five bells: Hoist slowly, danger.

Notice to men at bottom coming up.—Ring four bells. After engineer gives one blast with whistle, get on cage and ring one bell to be hoisted. Engineer wanting cage while at bottom will give four blasts with whistle before moving cage.

Conveying of Explosives.

SECTION 34. Blasting powder or explosives must not be taken into or out of a coal mine, or moved from place to place in a coal mine along any entry or haulway, where there are electric wires, while the power

is on such wires, except when such powder or explosive is conveyed in insulated cars or packages.

ANNUAL REPORT—REPORT OF ACCIDENTS.

Section 35. The owner, lessee, operator or person in charge of any mine shall on or before the first day of August in each year, send to the office of the inspector, upon blanks furnished by the State, a correct return with respect to the year ending July first of each year, the quantity of coal mined and the number of persons ordinarily employed in, at and around such mine, designating the number of persons below and above ground. In all cases the owner, operator, lessee or person in charge of any coal mine in this State, upon the happening of any accident by which injury occurs to any of the employes above or below ground, shall immediately report the same to the mine inspector, which report shall contain a detailed statement of the extent of the accident, and the manner in which it occurred, which report shall conform to the standard form of reports as provided by the mine inspector in such cases.

STRETCHERS, BLANKETS AND BANDAGES.

Section 36. The owner, operator, lessee or person in charge of any mine shall at all times keep in readiness for use in case of accident and at the mine at some convenient place, one good and substantial stretcher for each one hundred employes engaged in the operation of the mine, and proper and sufficient woolen blankets for each stretcher, together with a sufficient and reasonable supply of bandages.

CAPS, TIMBERS AND PROPS.

SECTION 37. The owner, agent or operator of any and all coal mines shall keep a supply of timber constantly on hand of sufficient length to be used as props and cap pieces, and the same shall be promptly delivered to the miner at his respective place of work, as he may designate in writing, on blanks to be furnished by the operator.

DUTIES OF MINE FOREMAN, OR PIT BOSS.

Section 38. It shall be the duty of the mine foreman, or pit boss in charge of any mine or part thereof, to make careful inspection of the working places in the mine two times each week by himself or assistant, and at any such other time as in his judgment may be required. He shall give such directions and formulate such rules for the guidance of the men employed in the mine, as skillful and safe operation of the mine may require. He shall see that the miners are supplied with props, when ordered by the miner, of proper length, caps and other timbers necessary to securely prop the roof of such mine and the rooms wherein the men are employed, and such material shall be delivered to their working places. He shall keep a careful watch over the ventilating apparatus and air ways, together with all of the stoppings, doors and other means of directing the air current. He shall examine the escape shaft, man-way, the traveling ways leading thereto from the main entries, on cause them to be examined by a competent person, once each day, and a

written report of the conditions of such shaft, man-way and traveling ways shall be made and filed in the office at that mine, which shall be open for examination at all reasonable times to the representatives of the employes and such other persons entitled thereto. A copy of such report shall be sent each month to the mine inspector. If he finds the conditions of the escape shaft, man-way or traveling ways impassable or dangerous, he shall immediately upon the discovery of the defect, place such instructions at the defective place as may be reasonably necessary to apprise the employes of the danger.

CAUSE AS TO PROPERTY-DOOR, ETC.

Section 39. No workman or other person shall knowingly injure a water-gauge, barometer, air-course, brattice, equipment or machinery, obstruct or throw open any air way, disturb any part of the machinery connected with the mine; open a door of a mine and neglect to close it, endanger the mine or those working therein; disobey any order given in pursuance of law, or do a wilful act whereby the life of persons working therein or the security of the mine or the machinery connected therewith may be endangered; and it shall be unlawful for any workman or person to place any refuse material or any obstruction in any part of the air-course or any part of the breakthrough, entries or rooms other than as by this act provided.

BLASTING IN MINES.

Section 40. When the time for blasting arrives, blasting shall be inrotation, beginning at the innermost working place in each entry. Immediately upon lighting blast, miners must notify the succeeding miners by shouting the word "fire."

RIDING LOADED CARS.

SECTION 41. It shall be unlawful for any employe, except employes in charge of such trip, to ride on any loaded trip of cars.

INTOXICANTS.

SECTION 42. No person shall go into, at, or around a mine, or the buildings, tracks or machinery connected therewith, while under the influence of intoxicants. No person shall use, carry or have in his possession, at, in, or around a mine, or the buildings, tracks or machinery connected therewith, any intoxicants.

SHALL PROP ROOF, ETC.

SECTION 43. Each miner or other person employed in the mine, shall securely prop the roof of the working place therein under his control, and shall obey any reasonable order, or orders, given by the superintendent or mine foreman relating to the security of the mine in the part thereof where he is at work. Such miner or other person, shall not be held to have violated the provisions of this clause if the owner, lessee or agent fails to supply the necessary props, caps and timbers as provided for in this act.

SHALL NOT WASTE PROPS, ETC.

SECTION 44. Each miner, or other person shall avoid waste of props, caps, timber or other material. When he has props, caps, timber or other material unsuited for his purpose, he shall not cover up or destroy same, but shall place it near the track where it can be readily seen, and it must immediately be removed by the operator upon the request of the miner.

INTENT TO DEFRAUD.

SECTION 45. No person shall erase or change a mark of reference or monument made in connection with measurements; change the checks or cars; wrongly check a car, or do any act with intent to defraud, and operator shall place stamp mark at end of each measurement in narrow work.

SANITARY CONDITIONS.

Section 46. For the purpose of observing the best sanitary conditions possible in the mines of this State, no employe therein shall use any portion of the mine excavations as a water closet that is not at least twenty-five feet from any air current.

PENALTY.

Section 47. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding thirty days, or both at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 48. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

REGULATING THE OPERATION OF BOATS.

(Act No. 113 of the Public Acts of 1909 as amended by Act No. 69, Public Acts of 1911.)

AN ACT regulating steam vessels and vessels operated by machinery, navigating the waters within the jurisdiction of this state, excepting vessels which are subject to inspection under the laws of the United States, and providing penalties for the violation hereof, and to declare waters navigated by such vessels public and navigable waters of the State of Michigan.

Inspector, Qualifications of.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

SECTION 1. The commissioner of labor shall be charged with the administration of the provisions of this act, shall employ an inspector who shall have had at least five years' experience as a licensed master or en-



gineer on steam vessels navigating the Great Lakes or any of their tributary waters, and who shall be otherwise properly qualified to enable the commissioner of labor to carry said provisions into effect, and shall exercise supervision over him in the performance of his duties.

DUTIES OF THE COMMISSIONER.

SECTION 2. The commissioner of labor shall annually or oftener if he has good cause to believe it reasonable, inspect or cause to be inspected every steam vessel or other vessel operated by machinery engaged in carrying passengers for hire, directly or indirectly, excepting vessels which are subject to inspection under the laws of the United States, examine carefully her hull, boats and other equipment, examine her engine and boilers, ascertain how long it will be safe to use the same, determine the pressure of steam to be allowed and to regulate the fusible plugs, safety valves and steam cocks as to insure safety and he may require such changes, repairs and improvements to be adopted and used as he may deem expedient for the contemplated route. He shall also fix the number of passengers that may be transported. He shall also, whenever he deems it expedient, visit any vessel licensed under this act, and examine into her condition for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not any party thereon having a certificate from him has conformed to and obeyed the conditions of such certificate and the provisions of The owner, master, pilot, captain or engineer of such vessel shall answer all reasonable questions, and shall give all the information in his or their power in regard to said vessel, her machinery and the manner of managing the same. In case of damage by fire or by explosion, collision or stranding, or by means of an electrical apparatus he may investigate the cause thereof, and if found by him to have been occasioned by a violation of any of the provisions of this act or of the orders, regulations and requirements issued by him, he shall so certify to the prosecuting attorney of the county where such violation occurred, together with the names of the persons guilty thereof and the witnesses. All waters navigated by vessels subject to the provisions of this act are hereby declared to be public and navigable waters, subject to the jurisdiction of the State of Michigan.

BOILERS TO BE TESTED.

SECTION 3. The commissioner shall also test the boilers of all steam vessels carrying passengers for hire before the same shall be used, and at least once in every year thereafter. In subjecting to the hydrostatic test boilers called and usually known under the designation of high pressure boilers, the hydrostatic pressure applied must be in proportion of one hundred fifty pounds to the square inch to one hundred pounds to the square inch of the steam pressure allowed. In subjecting to the hydrostatic test that class of boilers usually designated and known as low pressure boilers, the commissioner shall allow as the working power of each new boiler a pressure of only three-fourths the number of pounds to the square inch, to which it shall have been subjected by the hydrostatic test and found to be sufficient therefor; but should said commissioner be of the opinion that such boiler by reason of its con-

struction or material will not safely allow so high a working pressure he may, for reasons specifically stated in his certificate, fix the working pressure of such boiler at less than three-fourths of said test pressure; and no boiler or pipe or any of the connections therewith shall be approved, which is made in whole or in part of bad material or is unsafe in its form or dangerous from defective workmanship, age, use or other cause. In addition to the hydrostatic test as herein provided, the commissioner may cause a hammer test to be made and an internal examination of such boiler or boilers so tested, whenever deemed necessary. Any boiler having been in use ten years or more may be drilled at the bottom of shell or boiler, and also at such other points as the inspectors may direct, to determine, the thickness of such material at those points, and the general condition of such boiler or boilers at the time of inspection and the steam pressure allowed shall be determined by such ascertained thickness and general condition of the boiler. shall also see that all connections to the said boiler or engines are of suitable material, size and construction, and that the boiler, machinery and appurtenances are such as may be employed with safety in the service to be performed. He shall also satisfy himself that the safety valves are of suitable dimensions and that the weights of the same are properly adjusted so as to allow no greater pressure than the maximum amount prescribed by him, and that there is a sufficient number of gauge cocks. properly attached to the boiler so as to indicate the quantity of water therein, and suitable steam gauges to correctly show the amount of steam carried, and as to any other matter connected with such steam vessel or the machinery thereof that to said commissioner shall seem necessary to the safety of her passengers and crew, and he shall make such inspection, examination and test of naptha launches and electric or gasoline launches and their apparatus and machinery as will enable him to determine whether they can safely be used in navigation.

DUPLICATE CERTIFICATE, WHERE KEPT.

The commissioner, if satisfied that such vessel is in all respects safe and conforms to the requirements of this act, shall make and subscribe duplicate certificates, setting forth the age of the vessel, the length, breadth and depth, the date of the inspection, the name of the vessel, the name of the owner, the master, the number of licensed officers and crew which he deems necessary to manage the vessel with safety, the number of boats and life preservers required and the number of passengers that she can safely carry, and if a steam vessel, the age of the boiler and the pressure of steam she is authorized to carry. One of such certificates shall be kept posted in some conspicuous place on the vessel if practicable, or kept in some convenient place on the vessel to be designated by the commissioner in the certificate, accessible to any one demanding it, and the other copy shall be kept by the commissioner and by him recorded in a book to be kept for that purpose. If the commissioner refuse to grant a certificate of approval, he shall make a statement in writing, giving his reasons for such refusal, and deliver the same to the owner or master of the vessel.

PASSENGERS TRANSPORTED IN EXCESS OF.

Section 5. No greater number of passengers shall be transported upon any licensed steam vessel or other vessel included within the provisions of this act than the number allowed in the certificate of such vessel.

CONSTRUCTION OF STEAM BOATS AND OTHER VESSELS.

Section 6. All steamboats and other vessels to which this act is applicable shall hereafter be so constructed that the woodwork about the boilers, chimneys, fire-boxes, cookhouses, stove and steampipes or any machinery or apparatus involving danger of fire, where such woodwork is exposed to ignition shall be so shielded by some incombustible material that the air may circulate freely between such material and woodwork or other ignitible substances, and before granting a certificate of inspection the commissioner shall require that all other necessary provisions be made throughout such vessel as he may judge expedient to guard against loss or damage by fire.

STAIRWAYS AND GANGWAYS.

Section 7. Every vessel engaged in carrying passengers for hire shall be provided with permanent stairways and other sufficient means convenient for passing from one deck to the other, with gangways large enough to allow persons freely to pass, which shall be open fore and aft of the length of the vessel, and to and along the guards, and shall be kept unobstructed.

RULES OF NAVIGATION.

SECTION 8. From and after the passage of this act the following rules shall be observed in navigating all steam vessels when under steam and all boats propelled by machinery on the waters within the jurisdiction of the state, excepting the waters which are under the jurisdiction of the United States.

First, When two steamboats are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other after exchanging signals of one blast of the whistle;

Second, When two steam vessels are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the vessel which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other;

Third, When a steam vessel and a sailing vessel are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam vessel shall keep out of the way of the sailing vessel;

Fourth, When by any of these rules one of two vessels is to keep out of the way the other shall keep her course and speed;

Fifth, Every vessel under steam when approaching another steamboat or small boat or vessel of any kind so as to involve the risk of collision, shall slacken her speed, or if necessary shall stop and reverse her engine, and every vessel under steam shall when in a fog go at a moderate speed;

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Sixth, Any steam vessel overtaking another steam vessel shall keep

out of the way of the last mentioned steam vessel;

Seventh, When two steam vessels are going in the same direction the stern steam vessel wishing to pass the other shall signal the forward steam vessel of her intention to pass on the port side by two distinct whistles, and to pass on her starboard side by one distinct which shall be answered by the forward steam vessel with the same number of whistles, and the forward steam vessel shall keep on her course as though no signal had been given;

Eighth, Steamboats approaching each other shall, at not less than one hundred yards distance between each other, give a signal with one loud

distinct whistle.

Ninth, When two steamboats are approaching each other, and, if the course of such steamboats is so far on the starboard side of each as not to be considered by the pilots as meeting end on or nearly so, or if the steamboats are approaching each other in such manner that passing to the right as in rule one is deemed unsafe by the pilot of either steamboat, the pilot so first deciding shall give two short and distinct blasts on his steam whistle, which the pilot of the other steamboat shall answer promptly by two blasts of his steam whistle, and they shall pass to the left on the starboard side of each other;

Tenth, When two steamboats are approaching each other and the pilot of either steamboat fails to understand the course or intention of the other whether from the signals being given or answered erroneously or from other cause, the pilot so in doubt shall immediately signify the same by giving several short and rapid blasts of the steam whistle, and if the boats shall have approached within one hundred yards of each other, both shall be immediately slowed to a speed barely sufficient for steerage way until the proper signals are given, answered and understood, or until the boats have passed each other;

Eleventh, When a steamboat is running in a fog or thick weather it shall be the duty of the pilot to cause a long blast of the steam whistle

to be sounded at intervals not exceeding one minute;

Twelfth, Signals of distress shall be four distinct blasts of the whistle and shall be recognized by the master of any steamboat hearing the

same, and he shall render such assistance as in his power;

Thirteenth, In construing these provisions due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation and to any special circumstances which may exist rendering a departure therefrom necessary in order to avoid immediate danger;

Fourteenth, Every steam vessel which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing vessel, and every vessel under steam or otherwise propelled by machinery, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a steam vessel;

Fifteenth, Every vessel not a steam vessel shall be provided with a suitable whistle with which to give the signals provided for in this section;

Sixteenth, Nothing in this act shall be construed to extend to any boat or lighter not being masted, or if masted and not decked, employed in the harbor of any town or city;

Seventeenth, All steamboats licensed under the provisions of this act



shall conform to and obey such other rules and regulations as the commissioner may prescribe, not inconsistent herewith;

Eighteenth, The commissioner and the inspectors provided for in this act are authorized to make further rules and regulations applying generally to all steamboats or especially to one or more of them, and on framing rules for the government of managers and employes of boats, the commissioner shall as far as practicable be governed by the general rules and regulations prescribed by the United States board of supervising inspectors of steam vessels;

Nineteenth, Every steam vessel or other vessel propelled by machinery, carrying passengers for hire on the waters within the jurisdiction of this state, shall have two copies of this section framed, one to be conveniently placed for the government of the pilot, and the other to be hung in a conspicuous place on the boat for the inspection of the passengers.

LIGHTS TO BE CARRIED.

Section 9. The master of every steamboat or vessel propelled by machinery when navigating between sunset and sunrise, shall cause the same to carry the following lights:

First, At the foremost head a bright white light of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least two miles; and be so constructed as to show a uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of twenty points of the compass, and to be so fixed as to throw the light ten points on each side of the vessel from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side;

Second, On the starboard side a green light of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at least two miles; and be so constructed as to show a uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, and be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side:

Third, On the port side a red light of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles; and be so constructed as to show a uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of ten points of the compass, and to be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side. The green and red lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least thirty inches forward from the lights, so far as to prevent them from being seen across the bow: Provided, That boats having no superstructure may use the combination lights;

Fourth, All boats not propelled by machinery shall carry a white light visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere over the entire horizon when used upon waters where motor boats are being used.

FIRE APPARATUS TO BE CARRIED.

SECTION 10. Every steam vessel permitted by her certificate to carry two hundred passengers or upwards shall be provided with a good steam fire pump or other equivalent apparatus for throwing water, the same to be at all times during the navigation of such vessel kept ready for immediate use, having at least one hundred feet of hose of suitable size

and of sufficient strength to stand a pressure of at least seventy-five pounds to the square inch.

ROW BOATS TO BE CARRIED.

SECTION 11. Every ferry boat propelled by steam or electricity shall be provided with at least one substantial boat fifteen feet or more in length, properly supplied with oars and kept tight and in good condition at all times and so attached to such ferry boat that it may in case of need be launched into the water for immediate use. Every steamboat or vessel propelled by machinery and carrying passengers for hire, directly or indirectly, shall be provided, if of the measurement of two hundred fifty and less than five hundred tons burden, with at least two substantial row boats with life lines attached and properly supplied with oars and kept tight and in good condition at all times, and so attached as to be capable of being launched into the water for immediate use in case of need; and if of the measurement of five hundred tons or more, with at least one first-class life boat and one row boat twenty-five feet long by seven wide, capable of carrying or supporting fifty persons each, and at least one row boat of the usual size and construction, all to be properly supplied with oars and kept tight and in good condition at all times and so attached as to be capable of being launched into the water for immediate use in case of need. Every such vessel may also be required to carry such other boats as the commissioner on account of the route or the number of passengers shall deem requisite, and the master of such vessel shall exercise and discipline his crew in the launching, use and management of the boat until they become skillful boatmen.

LIFE PRESERVERS, NUMBER OF.

SECTION 12. Every steam vessel or vessel propelled by machinery used in the transportation of passengers for hire shall have a life preserver or life float for each passenger she is allowed to carry and for each member of her crew. At least one-half thereof shall be life preservers of a bouyancy not less than eighteen pounds, and the other half or part thereof may be life floats to be constructed of dry pine plank four feet long, two inches thick and twelve inches wide, with line properly attached in such manner as to be convenient for use; and it shall be the duty of the commissioner to satisfactorily ascertain that every life preserver and such life floats are as herein required. Such life preservers and life floats shall be kept in convenient accessible places in such vessel in readiness for immediate use in case of accident, and the places where the same are to be kept shall be designated in the commissioner's certificate and also pointed out by printed notices posted in such places as the commissioner directs. Every such vessel shall carry in convenient places at least ten buckets with dip lines attached, and three axes in good condition, but the inspectors may if they deem it necessary or proper require a larger, or in case of very small vessels, permit a smaller number of buckets and axes.



SAFETY VALVE OF BOILERS, OBSTRUCTION OF.

Whoever intentionally loads or obstructs or causes to SECTION 13. be loaded or obstructed in any way the safety valve of the boiler. or employs any other means or device whereby the boiler may be subjected to a greater pressure than the amount allowed by the commissioner's certificate, or intentionally deranges or hinders the operation of any machinery or device employed to denote the stage of the water or steam in any boiler, or to give warning of any approaching danger, or intentionally permits the water to fall below the prescribed low water limit of the boiler, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for a term of not exceeding three years, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction. If in the opinion of the commissioner of labor or inspector it is necessary to do so. the safety valve may be taken wholly from the control of all persons engaged in navigating such vessels and secured at the expense of the owner of the vessel by the commissioner.

MASTER, PILOT AND ENGINEER, EXAMINATION OF, LICENSE, WHERE POSTED.

Section 14. Every person employed as master, pilot or engineer on board of a steam vessel or a vessel propelled by machinery, carrying passengers for hire shall, unless holding a license issued by a United States board of inspectors covering the class of vessels on which he is employed, be examined by the commissioner as to his qualifications, and if satisfied therewith he shall grant him a license for the term of one year for such boat, boats or class of boats as said commissioner may specify in such license. In a proper case the license may permit and specify that the master may act as pilot, and in case of small vessels also as engineer and pilot. The license shall be framed under glass and posted in some conspicuous place on the vessel on which he may act. Where it is impracticable to keep such license so posted is shall be kept on board accessible to any person demanding it. Whoever acts as master, pilot or engineer, without having first received such license, or upon a boat or class of boats not specified in his license, or owner, lessee or agent employing him, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for each day that he so acts, except as in this act otherwise specified, and such license may be revoked by the commissioner for intemperance, incompetency or wilful violation of duty.

OIL.

SECTION 15. No licensed vessel carrying passengers for hire shall be allowed to use in lamps, lanterns or other lights on such vessel, any oil which will not stand a fire test of at least one hundred twenty degrees Fahrenheit.

VESSEL NAME.

SECTION 16. Every vessel subject to the provisions of this act shall have her name and the port to which she belongs painted on her stern on a black background in white, yellow or gilt letters or on a white background in black, yellow or gilt letters of not less than three inches

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in length. The commissioner may, however, in the case of small vessels, permit such names to be placed elsewhere and in letters of less length.

RECEIVING AND DISCHARGING PASSENGERS.

Section 17. No vessel carrying passengers for hire shall receive or discharge passengers by any method or means whereby any risk of drowning or other accident might be incurred, and the inspector shall prescribe such regulations, approved by the commissioner of labor as will make the receiving and discharging of passengers safe and convenient.

DANGEROUS ARTICLES NOT TO BE CARRIED ON LICENSED PASSENGER VESSEL.

SECTION 18. No loose hay, camphene, nitro-glycerine, naptha, benzine. benzole, coal oil, crude petroleum or other like explosives, burning fluids or dangerous articles, shall be carried as freight or used in stoves on any steamer or vessel licensed to carry passengers under this act, except that refined petroleum which will not ignite at a temperature of less than one hundred twenty degrees Fahrenheit may be carried on the main deck of any vessel: Provided, The barrels or cases containing such oil are fully provided with a tarpaulin. Nothing in this section provided shall be construed to prevent any vessel of twenty tons burden or under which uses petroleum for fuel from carrying sufficient petroleum with which to replenish the fires and properly equip such vessel for use; said petroleum to be carried in metal cans or tanks, which shall be properly protected by a covering of wood or other substance which would equally protect from accident, and be approved by said commissioner, and to be conveyed from said cans or tanks to said fires through metal pipes.

QUANTITY OF STEAM TO BE GENERATED.

SECTION 19. No master, engineer or other person having charge of the boiler or apparatus for the generation of steam of any steamboat or vessel carrying passengers for hire, shall create or allow to be created any undue or unsafe quantity of steam in order to increase the speed of such boat or to excel another boat in speed. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for a term of not exceeding three years, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction.

PENALTY.

SECTION 20. Every master, engineer or pilot who shall violate any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than two hundred fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction, unless a different penalty is prescribed.

OWNER, RESPONSIBLE FOR.

Section 21. The owner of every steamboat or vessel shall be responsible for the good conduct of the master employed by him, and if any penalty incurred by such master is not paid by him and cannot be collected from him by due course of law, it may be recovered of the owner or owners jointly or severally of the steamboat or vessel in whose employ he was at the time of the incurring of such penalty, in the same manner as if such owner or owners were sureties of such master.

LAWS TO BE POSTED.

Section 22. The master of every vessel carrying passengers for hire shall keep a copy of the preceding section of this act posted in a conspicuous place on such vessel for the inspection of all persons on board thereof.

REPORT TO BE MADE BY THE COMMISSIONER.

SECTION 23. The commissioner shall, on or before the first day of January in each year, make a verified report to the governor, containing a detailed statement of the names and number of vessels examined and licensed, the names and number of vessels to which licenses were refused and stating the reasons for the refusal, the names and number of persons examined and licensed, the names and number to whom licenses were refused and stating the reasons therefor, and may include in such report any other information he may deem desirable.

WHEN CERTIFICATES SHALL CONTINUE IN FORCE.

SECTION 24. All steam vessels, naptha, gasoline and electric launches or any craft propelled by machinery carrying passengers for hire must comply with all the terms and provisions of this act, and with all orders, regulations and requirements of the commissioner. If any such vessel is navigated without complying therewith except as herein stated or without the requisite certificates of the commissioner, the owners and masters shall forfeit to the state of Michigan the penalties prescribed in this act, and the vessel so navigated shall also be liable therefor and may be attached and proceeded against in any court having jurisdiction. If any such vessel is deprived of the services of any licensed officer without the consent, fault or collusion of the master, owner or any person interested in the vessel, the deficiency may be temporarily supplied for ten days, until a licensed officer can be obtained: Provided, That only one unlicensed officer shall be so employed at one time to supply such deficiency. If the owner or master of any vessel shall, at least twenty days before the expiration of his certificate, notify the commissioner of such expiration and request a new inspection and certificate, the certificate then expiring shall continue in force until an inspection is made and such owners and masters are not liable for any of the penalties provided in this act on account of navigating said vessel without such new certificate.



INSPECTION FEE, TO WHOM PAID.

Section 25. For each inspection provided for in sections two and three of this act the owner or master of each vessel shall pay the commissioner of labor an inspection fee, which shall not be less than five dollars nor more than twenty dollars, to be fixed by the commissioner of labor with reference to the size of the vessel inspected, which size shall be ascertained by some practical method adopted by the commissioner of labor for the use of the inspector. For each license issued under section fourteen of this act the person so licensed shall pay to the commissioner of labor the sum of five dollars: Provided, That boats of twenty-five feet length or less, and six feet beam or less shall be exempt from the provisions of this section. All of the fees received from this source shall be accounted for by the commissioner of labor to the state treasurer, and credited to the general fund.

COMPENSATION.

Section 26. The inspector provided for in this act shall receive six dollars per diem for the time actually engaged in making the inspections and examinations provided for herein, and shall be paid necessary traveling expenses when making such inspections and conducting such examinations at other than the domicile of said inspector, to be paid out of the general fund not otherwise appropriated, upon vouchers presented to the auditor general.

DEPUTY, WHO SO DEEMED.

Section 27. Any inspector duly employed by the commissioner of labor for the execution of any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed to be a deputy of said commissioner for the purposes hereof.

PENALTY FOR ADDITIONS, INTERPOLATIONS OR ERASURES.

SECTION 28. Every master, pilot, engineer or operator licensed under the provisions of this act, who shall change, by addition, interpolation or erasures of any kind, any certificate or license issued by the inspector referred to in this act, shall for every such offense upon conviction be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars or by imprisonment for a term of not exceeding three years, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction.

RECEIVING FEES, PUNISHMENT FOR.

SECTION 29. Any inspector who upon any pretense receives any fee or reward for his services, except that which is allowed to him by law, shall forfeit his office and be otherwise punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars or imprisonment not more than six months, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction.

SUPPLIES.

Section 30. The commissioner of labor shall procure for the inspectors such instruments, stationery, printing and other things necessary for his and their official use as may be required therefor under this act.

SEARCHLIGHT, FLASHING OF.

Section 31. Any person who shall flash or cause to be flashed the rays of a searchlight into the pilot house or into the eyes of the master, pilot, engineer or operator of an approaching or passing vessel, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and may, if he be a master, pilot, engineer or operator licensed under the provisions of this act, be further liable to have his license revoked in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction of the offense. Searchlights shall not be known as navigating lights.

Section 31a. This act is immediately necessary for the protection of

the public safety.

CERTIFYING FALSELY.

Section 32. Any inspector who wilfully certifies falsely touching any vessel under the jurisdiction of this state as to her hull, accommodations, boilers, engines, machinery or their appurtenances or any of her equipments, or any matter or thing contained in any certificate signed by him, shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both in the discretion of the court having jurisdiction of the offense.

ACCIDENT, REPORT TO WHOM MADE.

SECTION 33. Within forty-eight hours after a vessel meets with an accident involving a loss of life or damage to property, it shall be the duty of the owner or the licensed officer in charge of such vessel to prepare a report setting forth the details of the casualty and swear to the same before an officer authorized to administer oaths generally, which report shall be forwarded by mail or otherwise to the commissioner of labor without delay.

WITNESSES-OATHS.

SECTION 34. The inspector shall investigate all violations of the provisions of this act, and for such purpose shall have the power and is hereby authorized to subpoena witnesses and compel their attendance, and he may also administer all necessary oaths to any witnesses thus summoned.

SUSPENSION OF REVOCATION OF LICENSE.

SECTION 35. In all cases where the issue is the suspension or revocation of a license, the accused shall be allowed to appear by counsel and to testify in his own behalf before the inspector.

MAY APPEAL TO THE COMMISSIONER.

SECTION 36. Whenever the inspector refuses to grant a license to any person applying for the same, or suspends or revokes the license of any master, engineer, pilot or operator, any person deeming himself wronged by such refusal, suspension or revocation, may, within thirty days thereof on application to the commissioner of labor, have his case examined

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anew by such commissioner; and the inspector shall furnish to the commissioner in writing the reasons for his doings in the premises; and such commissioner shall examine the case anew and he shall have the same powers to summon witnesses and compel their attendance and to administer oaths that are conferred on the inspector; and such witnesses shall be paid in the same manner as provided for by section thirty-seven of this act; and such commissioner may revoke, change or modify the decision of such inspector; and like proceedings may be had by any master or owner of any vessel herein required to be inspected in relation to the inspection of such vessel or her boilers, machinery or other apparatus by such inspector.

WITNESS FEES AND TRAVELING EXPENSES.

Section 37. The state treasurer shall pay such fees to any witness summoned as provided by the preceding section for his actual and necessary travel and attendance as shall be officially certified to upon the back of such summons by the inspector or commissioner hearing the case, not exceeding the rate allowed for fees and to witnesses for travel and attendance in any circuit court of the state.

COMPULSORY EDUCATION OF CHILDREN.

(Act 179, Public Acts of 1917.)

AN ACT to amend sections one, three and four of act two hundred of the Public Acts of nineteen hundred five, entitled "An act to provide for the compulsory education of children, for penalties for failure to comply with the provisions of this act, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts conflicting with the provisions of the same," being sections five thousand nine hundred seventy-nine, five thousand nine hundred eighty-one and five thousand nine hundred eighty-two of the Compiled Laws of nineteen hundred fifteen.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

SECTION 1. Sections one, three and four of act two hundred of the Public Acts of nineteen hundred five, entitled "An act to provide for the compulsory education of children, for penalties for failure to comply with the provisions of this act, and to repeal all acts or parts of acts conflicting with the provisions of the same," and acts amendatory thereof, being sections five thousand nine hundred seventy-nine, five thousand nine hundred eighty-one and five thousand nine hundred eighty-two of the Compiled Laws of nineteen hundred fifteen, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Every parent, guardian or other person in the State of Michigan, having control and charge of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years, shall be required to send such child to the public schools during the entire school year, and such attendance shall be con-

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tinuous and consecutive for the school year fixed by the district in which such parent, guardian or other person in parental relation may reside: Provided, That in the following cases children shall not be required to attend the public schools:


- (a) Any child who is attending regularly and is being taught in a private or parochial school such branches as are usually taught in the public schools to children of corresponding age, or who, upon the completion of the work in such schools, shall present satisfactory evidence to the county commissioner of schools, and in appropriate cases, to the superintendent of schools, that he has completed sufficient work to entitle him to an eighth grade diploma;
- (b) Any child who has received an eighth grade diploma from the public schools;
- (c) Any child who is physically unable to attend school. If the truant officer is notified of the non-attendance of any child at school, and he shall find the one in parental control claiming that such child is physically unable to attend school, the truant officer may secure a written statement of a competent physician, certifying that such child is physically unable to attend school;
- (d) Children over fourteen years of age who have completed the work of the sixth grade whose services are essential to the support of their parents may be excused by the county commissioner of schools or city superintendent of schools from attendance at school, on the recommendation of the board of education of the district in which such children reside, and said board shall certify to the officers herein mentioned the facts in all such cases: Provided, Nothing in this act or any other act shall prevent children fourteen years of age or over from procuring a permit to work outside of school hours, during the school year;
- (e) Children under nine years of age, whose parents do not reside within two and one-half miles, by the nearest traveled road, of some public school: Provided, That if transportation is furnished for pupils in said district, this exemption shall not apply;
- (f) Any child twelve to fourteen years of age while in attendance at confirmation classes conducted for a period of not to exceed five months in either of said years: Provided, however, That any child claiming exemption from attending school under subdivisions (a) or (b) hereof, shall secure such permit as may be required under the statutes of Michigan covering the employment of minors, and shall be regularly employed at some lawful work if physically able so to do, or any child who has completed the work of the eighth grade who wishes to assist with the housework or farm work at home may be granted an excuse for such work. Such child must present to the officer who issued the excuse satisfactory evidence each month that he or she is actually assisting with said housework or farm work.
- SECTION 3. (a) It shall be the duty of the school director of all school districts, except in city, graded and township districts, to provide the teacher, at the commencement of school, with a copy of the last school census, together with the names and addresses of the persons in parental relation, also address of the county commissioner of schools. The teacher shall, at the opening of school and at such other times as may be necessary, compare said census list with the enrollment of the

school and report to the county commissioner of schools the names of the parents or other persons in parental relation whose children of the ages hereinbefore mentioned are not in regular attendance at school, also the names of parents or other persons in parental relation who have children of school age not included in such census and who do not attend school:

- In all city, graded and township districts the secretary of the (b) board of education shall, at the commencement of school, furnish a copy of the last school census to the superintendent of schools in such city. graded and township districts, together with the name and address of the truant officer under whose jurisdiction they act, and it shall be the duty of said superintendent at the opening of school to compare said census list with the enrollment of the school or schools, and from time to time as it may be necessary report to the proper truant officer the names and addresses of any parents or other persons in parental relation whose children of the ages hereinbefore mentioned are not in regular attendance at the public schools, also the names of parents or others in parental relation whose children are not in the school and whose names are not included in such census; it shall be the duty of the principal, or any other person or persons in charge of every private and parochial school in any city, or township of the county at the opening of such schools to furnish to the said superintendent or county commissioner of schools the name, age and grade of the child and the city or number of the district, the township and county where the parent, guardian or person in parental relation resides and the name and address of the parent, guardian or other person in parental relation of every child who has enrolled in such schools, and from time to time to report to said superintendent or county commissioner the name, age and grade of the child and city or number of the district, the township and county where the parent, guardian or person in parental relation resides and the name and address of every child who has enrolled in such schools, and the name, age and grade of the child and the city or number of the district, the township and county where the parent, guardian or person in parental relation resides and the name and address of the parent, guardian or other person in parental relation of every child who is not in regular attendance in such schools;
- (c) It shall be the duty of the truant officer of the city or district, whenever notified by the teacher, superintendent, or other person or persons of violations of this act, and the county truant officer, when notified by the commissioner of schools, to investigate all such cases of truancy or non-attendance at school, and if the children complained of are not exempt from the provisions of this act under the conditions named in section one, then he shall immediately proceed as it is provided in section four of this act: Provided, That it shall be the duty of the county truant officer when requested to do so by the county commissioner of schools to inspect the out-houses in primary districts and order repairs on the same, and in case the district board, after proper notification by the truant officer, fails to have such outhouses put in proper and sanitary condition it shall be the duty of the said truant officer to have such work done at the expense of the district;
- (d) In case any parent or other person in parental relation shall fail to comply with the provisions of this act, he shall be deemed guilty

of a misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof be fined not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or imprisonment in the county or city jail for not less than two nor more than ninety days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

- SECTION 4. (a) It shall be the duty of the county commissioner of schools to furnish the truant officer of the county, at the opening of the schools, with a list of the teachers and superintendents employed in his county in school districts other than in such city, graded and township districts as are described in section two of this act;
- In case any parent or other person in parental relation shall fail to send the child or children under his or her control to the public school, the truant officer, upon having notice from proper authority of such fact, shall immediately and within twenty-four hours thereafter give formal written notice in person or by registered mail, to the parent or other person in parental relation, that the child or children under his or her control shall present himself or themselves at the public school, except as hereinbefore provided, on the day following the receipt of such notice, with the necessary text-books for instruction in the proper school or schools of the district or city. Said notice shall inform the parent or other person in parental relation of the date that attendance must begin and that such attendance at school must be continuous and consecutive during the remainder of the school year as taught in the district. The truant officer shall, at the same time the said formal notice is given to the parent or person in parental relation, notify the teacher or superintendent or commissioner of the fact of notice, and it shall be the duty of the teacher or superintendent or commissioner to notify the truant officer of failure on the part of the parent or other person in parental relation to comply with said notice;
- It shall be the duty of all truant officers, after having given the formal notice hereinbefore described, to determine whether the parent or other person in parental relation has complied with the notice, and in case of failure to so comply he shall immediately and within three days after having knowledge or being notified thereof, make a complaint against said parent or other person in parental relation having the legal charge and control of such child or children, before any justice of the peace in the county where such party resides for such refusal or neglect to send such child or children to school; and said justice of the peace shall issue a warrant upon said complaint and shall proceed to hear and determine the same in the same manner as is provided by statute for other cases under his jurisdiction, and in case of conviction of any parent or other person in parental relation shall be punished according to the provisions of section three of this act: Provided, That in cities having a recorder's court and justices of the peace, the truant officer shall make the aforesaid complaint before the magistrate of said recorder's court or before a justice of the peace, and said magistrate or justice shall issue a warrant and proceed to hear and determine the case in the same manner as is provided in the statute for other cases under his jurisdiction:
- (d) It shall be the duty of all school officers, superintendents, teachers or other persons to render such assistance and furnish such information as they may have at their command to aid such truant officer in the performance of his official duty.



WORK ACCOMPLISHED BY THE TEN STATE FREE EMPLOYMENT BUREAUS.

Recognition of the fact that labor is one of the most perishable products offered for sale in any market, and that failure on the part of him who wishes to sell and him who desires to buy to promptly accomplish their related purpose and to exchange their commodities and their values necessarily means loss to both parties, led to the establishment of employment bureaus and employment agencies. Further thought of the direct interest of society as a whole and of communities and state in prevention of loss through lack of market facilities for labor brought about the establishment of State Free Employment Bureaus.

Act No. 37, Public Acts of 1905, directed the Commissioner of Labor to establish free employment bureaus in all cities in the state having a population of over 50,000 and authorizing the use of Labor Department funds for the purpose of advertising, not to exceed \$500 in any one year. Under the provision of this act two such bureaus were established, one in the city of Detroit, and one in the city of Grand Rapids, they being the only cities coming under the jurisdiction of the provisions of the Act. In 1907 further provision was made through legislative enactment for the establishment of free employment bureaus at Saginaw, Kalamazoo, and Jackson. In 1911 the Commissioner of Labor was authorized to establish five more free employment bureaus at Battle Creek, Bay City, Flint, Muskegon and Traverse City, but because of the fact that no funds were provided to meet the expenses required in connection with the operation of such additional bureaus the establishment and operation were not entered upon. The Legislature of 1915 created three more free employment bureaus, at Lansing, Bad Axe and St. Louis and provided additional appropriation for their maintenance.

All of these ten state agencies for the bringing together of the seekers for employment and those in need of temporary or permanent labor are now in the midst of increasingly successful operation.

Further recognization as to the success of the Michigan Free Employment Bureaus may be gleaned by the results of the work achieved from December 1, 1916, to November 30, 1917. During that period there were 37,805 applications from employers and 119,629 asked for by these employers. There were 38,632 new registrations, and 72,560 renewals from persons applying for work. Persons referred to positions for the year reached the enormous total of 111,192, and out of that number referred to positions there were 108,463 positions filled, which was 4,415 more positions filled than during the previous year.

The work of the ten Free Employment Offices from December 1, 1916, to November 30, 1917, is shown in detail in the following tables:



WAHELEE, MRS. MARY.—At once cover back stairway with corrugated steel and provide fire extinguishers in hall on second floor.

Bay City.

March 6, 1917.

MOORE, Antoine.—At once erect fire escape on your hotel either on Fifth Street or Jefferson Street side of same, said fire escape to be built according to state specifications.

Benton Harbor.

November 26, 1917.

DAWN HOTEL.—At once change windows at fire escapes to swing out and away from ladders of fire escape. Place signs in halls showing way to fire escapes and red lights at windows and doors where fire escape is located. Keep individual towels in all wash rooms.

Bessemer.

December 7, 1917.

GOGEBIC HOUSE.—Within twenty days install a toilet in the Gogebic House for separate use of females, have same properly lighted and ventilated and designated for Ladies Only. Install regulation ropes in all sleeping rooms on second floor as per section 4, Act 188. Provide chemical fire extinguishers in each hall on second floor as per Section 3, Act 188.

December 7, 1917.

MBS. T. W. PHILIP, OWNER NORTHWESTERN HOTEL.—At once install toilet for separate use of female employes, and disinfect and keep in a sanitary condition all toilets in hotel. Place regulation ropes in all bed rooms on second floor, also chemical fire extinguishers in halls in compliance with Section 3, Act 188.

Big Bay.

May 18, 1917.

HOTEL INDEPENDENCE.—At once make such changes as to give proper ventilation in basement kitchen of your hotel. Provide one more toilet for use of females working in said kitchen. Put handrail on stairway leading from main floor to second floor in said hotel.

Birmingham.

September 14, 1917.

BIBMINGHAM INN.—At once put toilet on first floor in good repair, also toilet of second floor on long hall in a sanitary condition. Clean out basement under restaurant.

September 15, 1917.

Peck Hotel.—At once have toilet in bath room put in good working order and in a sanitary condition. Install all sheets, quilts and blankets to be at least 90 inches in length. Put toilet off restaurant in working order and in a sanitary condition and keep it so.

August 29, 1917.

CRESCENT HOTEL.—At once place ropes in each sleeping room, bath room and hall where windows are located at outside of building, said ropes to be of sufficient length to reach to ground and securely fastened on inside of each room. Post notices in halls and room directing use of ropes in case of fire. Have paper and rubbish removed from basement.

Copemish.

February 16, 1918.

COPEMISH-HOUSE.—At once scrub floors throughout hotel. Disinfect and put hotel in a sanitary and healthy condition. Build new toilet for ladies, also one for men, and keep same in sanitary condition. Give kitchen a thorough cleaning.

Crystal Falls.

December 26, 1917.

GREEN HOTEL.—Within thirty days calcimine kitchen, and put same in a sanitary condition. Fasten ropes in sleeping rooms so that they cannot slip off hooks. Furnish all sheets 90 inches in length.

Detroit.

March 12, 1917.

AVALO HOTEL.—At once provide handrails for all stairways; guard stairway opening on third floor. Provide chemical fire extinguishers for hallways. Extend balcony of fire escape to take in the window of hallway on third floor; post printed notices directing way to same as provided for in Sections 2-3 of State Law.

March 17, 1917.

AVALO HOTEL.—At once extend balcony of fire escape to take in west window of hallway on third floor of three story building at 70 East Congress Street, known as Avalo Hotel.

HOTEL IRQUOIS.—Provide chemical fire extinguishers for each floor.

LEONARD HOTEL.—At once provide halls with chemical fire extinguishers and post printed notices in halls and bed rooms calling attention to fire escape.

December 13, 1917.

HOTEL LINCOLN.—At once post printed notices in halls and bedrooms calling attention to fire escapes and directing use of same.

MACK HOTEL.—At once provide chemical fire extinguishers in halls, also post printed notices in bed rooms calling attention and giving direction to fire escape.

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COAL MINE INSPECTION

COAL MINE INSPECTION.

Office of State Coal Mine Inspector, Flint, Mich., Dec. 1, 1917.

Honorable Richard H. Fletcher, Commissioner of Labor, Lansing, Mich.:

Dear Sir:—I submit herewith my annual report for the year ending November 30, 1917.

For the greater part of the year just closed there were in operation in the State of Michigan twenty-three coal mines situated in the counties of Bay, Calhoun, Eaton, Genesee, Saginaw, Shiawassee.and Tuscola.

The abnormal conditions under which the coal mines operated in some states during 1917 were reflected in the unprecedented tonnage produced in Michigan.

For the fiscal year ending December 30th, 1917, a total of 1,393,280 tons of coal was produced in Michigan. The number of tons of coal produced in Michigan in 1916 was 1,076,215, showing an increase of 317,065 tons of coal mined in Michigan over the previous year. Probably no year in the history of the coal mine industry in the State of Michigan showed greater progress than in 1917. This progress was undoubtedly stimulated by the war.

The conservation of human life in the coal mines of the State is of paramount importance and is being considered by the legislative labor organizations and the individual employes. Every fatal accident leaves its impression on the community in the loss of a useful citizen and the provider for a family, with the result that many widows and orphans are rendered public charges for which taxpayers must contribute support. The sufferings and privations borne by many of the dependents can not be measured by words nor compensated by money equivalent.

Here is an industry employing 2,000 men, of whom two out of every 1,000 are killed each year, at least 100 per 1,000 are injured to the extent that time is lost and in most cases medical attendance required. From the point of view of the humanitarian no greater good for the industry can be accomplished than a reduction of the number of accidents which happen yearly. Experience is showing that accidents may be reduced in number, although they cannot be eliminated entirely.

During the year of 1917 a total of 352 accidents was reported of which five proved to be fatal, 47 serious, 107 severe and 194 slight. It is regretable that the number of accidents accounted for in this period is greater than the previous year.

I am submitting herewith the conditions found in each mine and the report of coal mine inspection in accordance with Act No. 177 of the Public Acts of 1913.

BAY COUNTY.

ROBERT GAGE COAL Co., No. 6.—Charles Coryell, Manager; Mine Foreman, H. Lewis; Chairman Mine Committee, B. Shickels. All weights, measures and scales were found correct. One weighman employed by the company and one employed by the men. Both of these weighmen had taken the oath of office. I found that the date of the last survey as indicated by mine map was made in July, 1917. The abandoned workings are properly safeguarded. The amount of air entering intake per minute was found to be 25,000 cubic feet. This air is properly distributed through the mine. This mine does not generate gas. Every precaution is taken to safeguard employes. The ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung. The breakthroughs are of proper width and the right distance apart. Permission not given to use curtains. Lubricating oil is guarded from fire. All roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste. Electric wiring is properly strung and safe guarded. The exhaust from engine is carried off properly. are six fire extinguishers in the mine and are of easy access in case of The boiler and engine room are properly constructed. A washroom is provided and properly outfitted. There is sufficient means of egress with stairs for escape shafts. A speaking tube is installed and the cage is properly constructed and covered, the safety clutches are approved and safety gates provided. A daily record is kept of the conditions of machinery used for hoisting purposes. The law governing the hoisting and lowering of men is strictly followed. Exit sign cards are properly posted. All escape ways are free from foul air, ice and obstructions. Proper lights are used at top and opening of shaft. The stables are properly located and constructed. Places of refuge are provided and kept free of obstructions. A code of signals is posted in plain view of engineer and in other places as designated by law. Stretchers, blankets and bandages are provided. Timber is provided and props used are sufficient for safety. General condition of this mine is fair.

Robert Gage Coal Co., No. 7.—Charles Coryell, Manager; Mine Foreman, John Campbell. I inspected this mine September 11th and found it in first class condition. Amount of cubic feet of air entering intake per minute is 22,500, which is equally distributed throughout the mine. This mine does not generate gas. Every possible precaution is taken to safeguard the health and safety of the employes, ventilating doors being properly constructed and hung, the breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Permission was not given to use curtains. All roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste, the electric wiring is properly strung and safeguarded. The exhaust from engine is properly carried off. In this mine six extinguishers are kept in easy access in case of fire. The boiler and engine room are constructed properly; all the requirements are strictly followed.

Beaver Coal Co.—Charles Coryell, Manager; Mine Foreman, Frank Heath. This mine was inspected on September 14, and found 28,000 cubic feet of air entering intake per minute, the air was found not properly distributed in all places. General conditions were found fair, gas not generated in this mine. Proper precautions are taken to safeguard employes, ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung, break-

throughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Oil used is up to the standard, lubricating oil is guarded from fire. All roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste, electric wiring is properly strung and safeguarded. Exhaust from engine is properly carried off, six fire extinguishers within easy access are installed. engine rooms are properly constructed, wash room properly outfitted is There are sufficient means of egress for all men employed with stairs furnished for escape shaft. A speaking tube is provided, cage properly covered and constructed, the safety clutch is approved and safety gates installed. A daily record is kept of conditions of machinery used for hoisting purposes. The law governing the hoisting and lowering of men is obeyed. Exit sign boards are properly posted. Escape ways are free from foul air, ice and obstructions. Proper lights are used at top and opening of shaft. Places of refuge are provided and kept free of obstructions. A code of signals is posted in plain view of engineer and also in other places as designated by law.

WOLVERINE MINE No. 2.—R. M. Randall, Manager, Mine Foreman, Alex McElwain. This mine was inspected September 7th, fair conditions were found to exist. One weighman is employed by the company and one by the employes, both having taken the oath of office. The last survey of this mine as shown by mine map was August, 1917. abandoned workings are properly guarded. The amount of air entering intake is 36,500 cubic feet per minute, which is equally distributed through the mine. This mine does not generate gas. All necessary precautions are taken to safeguard the life and health of the employes. The ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung. The breakthroughs are all of proper width and right distance apart. Permission was not granted for the use of curtains. All roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste. The electric wiring is properly strung and safeguarded. The exhaust from the engine is properly carried off. Number of fire extinguishers, six, and so placed as to make them easy of access in case of fire. The boiler and engine room are properly constructed. Washroom is provided for the men with a proper equipment thereto. There is sufficient means of egress for the men employed with stairs to escape shaft, a speaking tube is installed and cage is properly constructed and covered, safety clutches and safety gates are provided. A daily record is kept of the condition of machinery used for hoisting purposes. The law providing for the hoisting and lowering of men into and out of the mine is obeyed. Exit sign boards are properly posted. All escape ways are free from foul air, ice and obstructions. At top and opening of shaft proper lights are installed, places of refuge are provided and kept free from obstructions. The signal code is posted in plain view of engineer and in other places as designated by law. Stretchers, blankets and banadges are provided. Timber is provided and props used are sufficient for safety.

Sun Coal Mine Co.—O. S. Gallagher, Manager. This mine was inspected October 9th. The Company employed a weighman who qualified by taking oath of office. The abandoned workings are properly guarded; 15,000 cubic feet of air enters intake per minute which is properly distributed through the mine. Proper precautions are taken to protect the

employes, i. e., ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung, breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Permission to use curtains not granted, roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste, electric wiring properly strung and safeguarded. Exhaust from engines properly carried off, sufficient means of egress escape shaft having stairs, speaking tube is provided, cage properly covered and constructed, safety clutches approved, safety gates provided. A daily record is kept of the conditions of machinery used for hoisting purposes and the provision of the law governing the hoisting and lowering the men out of the mine is obeyed. Exit signboards are properly posted. Escape ways are free from foul air, ice and obstructions, proper lights are used at top and opening of shaft, places of refuge are provided and kept free of obstructions. The general condition of this mine is fair.

SAGINAW COUNTY.

ROBERT GAGE COAL Co., No. 2.—Charles Coryell, Manager, Mine Foreman, S. W. Rockwell. This mine is located in Saginaw County. I made this inspection on August 7th and found conditions as follows. The number of weighmen employed by the company was two, one employed by the company and one by the employes; these weighmen qualified by taking the oath of office. A daily record is kept of condition of the machinery used for hoisting purposes, while the provision of the law as to hoisting and lowering men is strictly obeyed. Exit signboards are properly posted. The escape ways are free from foul air, ice and other obstructions. Good and sufficient light is installed at the top and opening of the shaft. Places of refuge are provided and kept free from obstruction. A code of signals is posted in plain view of the engineer and in all other places which is designated by law. Stretchers, blankets and bandages are provided. Timber is provided and the props used are sufficient for safety. The general conditions are fair.

BANNER COAL COMPANY, -- Manager, William B. Carmichael. I inspect-

ed this mine on October 4th. The company and employes retain the services of one weighman each, both are qualified, having taken the oath of office. Last date of survey as indicated by map of mine was April. 1917. All abandoned workings are properly safeguarded. On this date there was 20,800 cubic feet of air per minute going in at the inlet, this is properly distributed through the mine. Proper precautions are taken to safeguard the employes. Ventilating doors being properly constructed and hung, and breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Lubricating oil is guarded from fire, all roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste, electric wiring is properly strung. Six fire extinguishers are kept in this mine and placed in such position that they are of easy access in case of fire. The boiler and engine rooms are constructed according to law. The owners furnish and have equipped a wash room for the employes. There is sufficient means of egress for all employed. Escape shaft is equipped with stairway. A speaking tube is provided, cages properly covered and constructed, safety clutches approved and safety gates installed. A daily record is kept of conditions of machinery used for hoisting purposes. In hoisting and lowering men the provisions of the law are obeyed. Exit signboards are properly posted. All escape ways are free from foul air, ice and other obstructions. Proper lights ase used at top and opening of shaft. A place of refuge is provided and kept free from obstructions. Signal code is posted in plain view of engineer and in other places designated by law. Stretchers, blankets and bandages are provided. Timber is provided and props used are sufficient for safety. The general condition of this mine is fair.

BLISS COAL MINING CO.—C. E. Linton, Manager. Number weighmen employed by company one, by employes one. Weighmen have qualified by taking oath of office. Last survey made as indicated by map of mine September, 1907. All abandoned workings are safeguarded. Cubic feet of air entering intake per minute 42,000, which is properly distributed throughout the mine. This mine does not generate gas. All precautions are taken to safeguard employes. The ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung. The breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Permission not given for use of curtains. Lubricating oil is guarded from fire. Roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste. Electric wiring is properly strung and safeguarded. Gasoline engines not used, exhaust from engines is properly carried off. The number of fire extinguishers are six and are in easy access in case of fire. The boiler and engine room is properly constructed. operator furnishes wash room for men, which is properly equipped. Breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. Lubricating oil is guarded from fire. All roads and drains kept free from accumulated waste. The electric wiring properly strung and safeguarded. Exhaust from engine is properly carried off. The number of fire extinguishers installed are in easy access in case of fire. The boiler and engine room are properly constructed. Operator has been provided a wash room and properly equipped same for the men. There is sufficient means of egress for the men employed, escape shafts have stairway. A speaking tube is installed and cages are properly covered and constructed, safety clutches are approved and safety gates are provided. A daily record is kept of the condition of machinery used for hoisting purposes. In hoisting and lowering of men the provisions of the law are obeyed. Exit signboards are properly posted. All escape ways are free of foul air, ice and other obstructions. Proper lights are used at top and opening of shaft. Places of refuge, kept free from all obstructions are provided. Inspection of this mine was made October 5, 1917; there are two weighmen employed, one by the company and one by the employes, they qualified by taking the oath of office. The last survey made of the mine was in July, 1917; number cubic feet of air entering intake per minute is 19,000 cubic feet, which was found to be equally distributed throughout the The abandoned workings and lubricating oil are properly safe-The ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung, breakthroughs are of proper width, and right distance apart. Permission not given for the use of curtains. Roads and drains are kept free from accumulated waste. Electric wiring is properly strung and safeguarded. Exhaust from engine is properly carried off. The number of fire extinguishers in mine is six, placed in easy access in case of fire. Boiler and engine rooms are properly constructed. Operators provide proper equipped wash room for the men. There is sufficient means of egress for men employed and escape shaft provided with stairway. tube is installed and the cages are properly covered and constructed, safety clutches are approved and safety gates provided. This mine keeps a daily record of the condition of machinery used for hoisting purposes, and the provisions of the law as to hoisting and lowering men

The date of last survey as shown by the map of the mine was July, 1917. All abandoned workings are safeguarded. Number cubic feet of air entering intake is 36,000 per minute, which is not properly distributed throughout the mine. Mine does not generate gas. The necessary precautions taken to safeguard employes. Ventilating doors are properly constructed and hung, breakthroughs are of proper width and right distance apart. B. S. K. COAL MINING Co., at Albion, is the only mine developed in this county. W. A. Knapp is Manager. The engines. boiler, cages, safety clutches, hoisting cables, scales, traveling ways, escape shaft and stairway in shaft are all in good condition.

What Cheer Mine No. 2.—Manager A. N. Fancher. This is a new shaft near the City of Flint. A coal vein of good quality has been struck. All precautions are being taken to safeguard the employes,

SHIAWASSEE COUNTY.

Superior Coal Co., No. 1.—Manager, W. E. Evans. All weights, measures and scales are correct. The company and the employes each employ one weighman, both of whom are qualified. This mine was inspected on January 18, 1917, and the last survey was made, as shown by the mine map in January, 1917. General conditions of this mine are fair.

BOAT INSPECTION

OFFICE OF STATE BOAT INSPECTOR.

January 2, 1918.

Hon. Richard H. Fletcher, Commissioner of Labor, Lansing, Mich.:

DEAR SIR:—I have pleasure in submitting herewith my yearly report as inspector of marine equipment on the inland waters of the State for the year 1917. Owing to the shortage of labor required to operate boats, such as masters, pilots and engineers, the shortage being caused by the attractive wages in munitions factories, to enlistments and drafts into the army, a perceptible falling off in the number of boats put in operation for the season of 1917 was caused, thereby causing a decline in the number of inspections made and certificates issued. The same thing holds true in the decrease of the number of licenses issued.

During the season there were issued 97 engineer and pilot licenses, two master and engineer licenses and four engineer licenses. There were inspected 87 passenger boats plying on the inland waters of the State. It gives the inspector great pleasure to inform you that each and every one of these boats operated for hire, complied strictly with the law governing such crafts. The owners and operators have come to a realization of the importance of the law under which these boats are operated and so seem pleased and willing to cooperate with the inspector in complying with orders issued, which makes for better and safer transportation on the inland waters of the State. To the thoughtless person this branch of the service perhaps would seem unimportant, but when one stops to consider that thousands of pleasure seekers are carried during the operating season and the opportunity presented for grave accidents, it is apparent that it is one of the most important services that can be rendered by the State.

PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES

PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES.

The Legislature of 1913 enacted a law designed to regulate the method of conducting the business of private employment agencies in the State for the benefit and protection of the laboring people. General supervision of the enforcement of the law, authority to prescribe rules and regulations for the conduct of the business along equitable lines, receiving of licenses' fees and issuance of licenses was delegated to the Labor Department. The amount of license fees to be paid by private agencies was fixed upon a graduated scale ranging from \$25.00 per year, the lowest, which applies to agencies located in cities of less than 200,000 population, to \$100.00 per year, the highest, applies to agencies operating in cities of over 200,000 inhabitants. The law further requires each applicant to furnish a surety bond in the penal sum of \$1,000.00 conditioned that the obligor will not violate any of the provisions of the law. Such bond, Act 244, P. A., 1917, is required to be a personal bond with two good and sufficient securities, to be approved by the prosecuting attorney or the circuit judge of the county in which such employment agency is located.

In order to secure accurate knowledge as to the working and sufficiency of the law in serving the purpose for which it was intended and for the protection of those whose interest the statute was enacted for, an investigation was made. This investigation from this standpoint covered a wide field and embraced a fair representation of all kinds of labor, who depend chiefly upon the employment agency for securing work.

From the volume of expression it is apparent that, while the laboring people as a class are naturally independent and are reluctant to accept a service in the form of charity, they are inclined to rebel at the thought of being compelled to pay for something to which they feel inherently entitled, and in the securing of which they expect to deliver value received for the wages they receive in return for their labor. Although there is no question that the present law has done much to relieve the laboring man and woman from the greater portion of the burden of impositions which they were made to suffer under old conditions, judging from the nature of the complaints which have been lodged with this department and the conditions expressed regarding the working of the law, there is a certain amount of exploitation still being practiced in the traffic of labor, to the prompt and effectual elimination of which immediate steps should be taken.

During the year 1917 applications were received and bonds were filed and licenses issued to thirty-five agencies in Detroit; Escanaba, four; Grand Rapids, two; Iron Mountain one; Iron River, one; Kalamazoo, one; Marquette, one; Menominee, one; Pontiac, two; Saginaw, two; Sault Ste. Marie two. The total receipts for 1917 were \$3,589.89. Evidently, through an oversight on the part of the Legislature in framing the law these receipts are turned into the general fund of the State Treasurer, whereas, in order that the best results may be obtained in the enforcement of the law, this money should properly be credited to this Department to help defray the expenses of administering the law.

The Ionia State Hospital receives as patients insane inmates of the various prisons, individuals undergoing trial in criminal courts found to be insane, and certain patients in the other State Hospitals considered "dangerous and homicidal." Notwithstanding such an atisocial class to begin with, it has been found by the experience of the last few years that they may be accorded all the modern methods of the civil insane hospital within limits of reason dictated by the demand of the police power obtaining in the large number of its patients. Though handicapped considerably by lack of suitable buildings occupational therapy of real work is practiced to a large degree.

Farm work is specialized in. General agriculture is practiced but most emphasis is laid upon garden crops. The surplus of garden crops above daily consumption is preserved for winter use. A high producing dairy herd is maintained from which surplus male stock for breeding purposes is sold throughout the State. A flock of eight-hundred White Leghorns produces all the eggs the institution uses. To meet the war demand, pork production has been intensified with definite

profit. This year, over \$5,000.00 of pork will have been sold and a slightly smaller amount consumed. The increased land available as a result of recent special appropriations has been a wonderful aid in keeping down the tremendous increase in cost incident to the war.

The institution needs at the present time more room on the main site to accommodate one-hundred and ten patients now housed in the original buildings of the institution three miles away, a congregate dining hall of sufficient size to accommodate all patients whose mental condition would allow them to eat there, with a compactly arranged kitchen and bakery and sufficient industrial and recreational space within the buildings. The Chapel, for example, contains seats for one-hundred and fifty persons. There are among our population at least three-hundred who should be allowed such privileges.

Special effort has been made during the past year to increase the products from the farm. In spite of the unfavorable season we have been able to produce more than double what we had last year.

We have also endeavored to economize as much as possible in the use of coal. We have displaced the 45 H. P. engine, the running of which required three or more tons of coal per day, with a motor, the operation of which costs but 50c per day. We have installed a vacuum pump and have placed traps in all of the buildings and have already attached three additional cottages on the north side to the main heating plant. Plans are under way to attach the six buildings on the south side. When this is done we shall have one central heating plant instead of a number of separate plants. It is estimated that enough coal will be saved during the present year to pay for installing the system.
